

WORDS FROM REV. DR. JOHN C. LENTZ, JR.

Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord from heaven! Praise God in the heights! Psalm 148:1



I admit it, I am really feeling the countdown to retirement. Or, as I have been calling it, graduation! And it is a graduation, of sorts. You all have taught me so much and I will take it out into the world. Thank you!

This is my antepenultimate *Tower* letter! I have two more Session meetings to moderate. AND, I have only six more sermons to preach. (Inside scoop... Deanne is preaching on July 28!)

Like you, I have anxieties. What do I do on Sunday, August 11?

One of the hardest realities of retirement

If we see each other at the Rec Center, Cumberland Pool, Dave's, Progressive Field, Severance Hall or on the street, OF COURSE we stop and greet and share what is going on in life. We will never stop caring for you all: "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love!" But we shouldn't talk about the church. And, frankly, when you call a new pastor that you are thrilled about, I may not want to hear about how great she is. How young and funny he is. How wonderful their sermons are and how swiftly the Session meetings fly by!!

We will figure it out. Deanne and I are so very grateful to you.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Forest Hill Church met on April 24, 2024. Pastor John Lentz was the Moderator for the meeting.

After opening with prayer, Pastor Lentz called attention to the Vision Statement of Session which had been developed during a retreat earlier in March. The vision statement is:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by being: spiritually led, more diverse, fully prepared to serve, living into individual gifts, connecting with and across ministries and communicating openly and actively with congregants, as a Matthew 25 and beloved community.

Moderator Lentz announced that a new person, Jace Holmes, has joined the staff as Bookkeeper.

Session approved elders to represent the church as commissioners at Stated Meetings of the Presbytery of the Western Reserve in meetings throughout the remainder of the year. The church is entitled to send two commissioners to each meeting.

The financial reports dated March 31, 2024 were received by session elders in advance of the meeting.

Twanda Patterson was examined and joyfully received by Session as a new member of the church.

The Personnel Committee recommended two items related to the retirement of Moderator Lentz. Session approved those items. Those items are confidential and not reported here. At the recommendation of the Celebration Committee, Session approved the serving of alcoholic beverages on Saturday, August 3 for the celebration of John's retirement. These will include beer, wine, and champagne.

Pastor Lentz invited elders to share their thoughts on the recent presentation on the results of the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT) by Elizabeth Holmes, Holy Cow! Consultants. Elders were thankful for the excellent turnout of congregants for the gathering and the highly professional presentation. The results highlighted the drivers of satisfaction, areas where FHC exceeded benchmarks, and areas where the church fell short in comparison with benchmarks.

Some of the results were complex and challenging for some to fully understand. Other results highlighted areas for growth.

While respondents were generally positive about their levels of satisfaction, elders noted that those who felt negatively about some aspects of their experience at FHC should be heard and their concerns kept in mind. Pastor Lentz noted that ways to move forward are to "tell the stories" about FHC over the past 30 years, communicate more about the work of Session, and move through the transition with the CAT results in mind. Pastor Lentz challenged elders to talk about the CAT results within their ministries and seek ways to respond.

Pastor Lentz reported on those who have agreed, so far, to serve on the Transitional Pastor Search Committee. Elders were asked to volunteer, as well as to provide additional names to fill out the slate. The results of that effort are highlighted elsewhere in this issue.

Strategic priorities for endowment were discussed. Each ministry talked about their plans for use of endowment funding. Final decisions will be made at the next meeting.

The meeting closed with a circle-prayer reflection on the prompt of "Thank you, God, for ... " in Christ's name at 8:56 PM.

2024 RON REGISTER SCHOLARS

The Ron Register Scholarship is named in honor of FHC's own Ron Register, who served on the Cleveland Heights-University Heights Board of Education for 16 years, including four terms as president. Two Cleveland Heights High School graduates were selected to receive awards of \$2,500 this year.

Gionni Mitchell is an active Heights student. She holds an exceptional grade point average and was inducted into the National Honor Society in her sophomore year. Her school activities include the Minority Student Achievement Network (MSAN), where she has found opportunities to mentor and tutor other students, and the Senior Student Council. She played volleyball for four years and captained the varsity team her senior year. She also ran track and held a part-time restaurant job in her junior and senior year. Her teacher references cite her leadership skills, her commitment to herself and the community and a drive to succeed. Gionni plans a future career in Business, potentially in Real Estate.

Egypt Sa'ad also received the Ron Register In addition to carrying an Scholarship. excellent GPA, Egypt has been extensively involved in activities during her years at Heights. She participated in MSAN for all four years. She was nominated by district leadership to be part of the First Ring Student Leadership Institute during her sophomore and junior years. In addition to playing lacrosse and holding down part-time work, Egypt found time to serve as a school ambassador and mentor for refugee students. Her teacher reference noted her natural leadership skills, strong work ethic and her initiative in helping other students. Egypt plans a career as a criminal defense lawyer.

TRANSITIONAL PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

We welcome and thank Nicole Lawrence, Dick Obermanns, Adam Majot, Marcie Denton, and Ron Zimmerman who have agreed to serve on the Transitional Pastor Search Committee.

The Transitional Pastor Search Committee is a committee of Session, tasked with finding a pastor who will serve the church and sign a one-year contract with the Session. That contract can be extended, if needed. This committee will seek a pastor whose approach to ministry aligns with the vision and mission of FHC and the ways in which we discern our future.

Although a Transitional Pastor can come from anywhere, it is probable that they will be someone from N.E. Ohio. The Transitional Pastor role does not require a Presbyterian, although probably they will be.

A Transitional Pastor is usually someone

who is retired and has good listening and preaching skills. The task of the Transitional Pastor is to help the congregation get ready for new pastoral leadership.

Please pray for the work of the committee. If you have any questions, you may ask Elizabeth Shaw, the Session Clerk, or a member of the Transitional Pastor Search Committee.

It is hoped that the Transitional Pastor will begin their term here in September.

Note: The committee that will search for the next ordained and installed pastor will come from the church's nominating committee and will be voted on by the congregation. This process will commence sometime before the end of 2024. Getting the Lead Out

We are familiar with the problems experienced a few years ago (and still) with lead in the water supply in

Flint, Michigan. Unfortunately, this is but one example. Many of our cities, both urban and rural areas with older homes and municipal infrastructure, contain lead in pipelines, as well as other sources like house paint, which decays over time. Lead dust debris can be ingested. Lead-contaminated drinking water has been shown in several medical studies in children to be linked to permanent intellectual disabilities and behavioral disorders.

Additional sources of lead that people may not be aware of include small airplane use of leaded gasoline and steel production. These two usages generate toxic air pollutants, and industrial lead pollution directly affects under-privileged communities living close to the source. Earthjustice has confronted the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), who is primarily responsible for oversight of safe drinking water, to enforce and strengthen actions to tackle the lead problem:

- replacing deteriorated lead pipelines through monies provided by the 2021 infrastructure Inflation Reduction Act. For example, Newark, NJ, has already replaced nearly all of its 23,000 lead service lines.
- creating a rule that any amount of lead dust in homes, schools, and daycares is hazardous and must be removed
- adopting of regulations for leaded aviation gasoline
- adoption of new rules regarding toxic emissions from steel mills.

Despite these positive actions, there continues to be legislative opposition to regulations which are thought by some to enhance governmental interference and control. The EPA is a governmental agency engaging in environmental responsibility, and is deserving of our support.



We anticipate that organizations that receive a grant will share their work with us in other ways, as well—perhaps via a visit, a brief report, a Zoom learning opportunity, or other structures to help us learn from the grantees and their work. ADOPT A GARDEN

We thank Jim and Pat Seeders for their years of service and keeping the gardens beautiful!

Now, we are proposing an "Adopt a Garden" program to maintain the gardens at the church. If you are interested in adopting one or more garden areas, please contact Gary Lustic (216-371-2084 or galustic@gmail. com).

Responsibilities include:

- Clean out and prune your garden in the spring. If you get your area cleaned out before spring cleanup day, we can schedule the Boy Scout Troop to spread mulch.
- Work your garden twice per month, weeding and keeping things trimmed. If you have a group of four, you could have two people work one time each month.
- Some areas might have large pots which could be planted with annuals in the late spring.
- Clean out and prune your garden in the fall. Again, scheduling your entire group would make this manageable.

The church will budget for all supplies: mulch, yard bags and any plant materials. We recommend bringing your own garden tools.

John's words in his sermon on the morning of May 19, 2024, were prescient of what took place outside of the church doors right after the service. To paraphrase John: Preparation, patience, and people in community together is when the spirit is released. There is abundant power and abundant energy in that moment. Preparation, timing and meeting the moment produce miracles.

It was surely a miracle that the hard work, preparation, and patience of many was rewarded. It was surely a miracle that the weather was beautiful, that Kemp was able to join us for the dedication, and that his friends from college were there to celebrate with him.
