No place looks like itself, loss of outline Makes everything look strangely in-between, Unsure of what has been, or what might come.


In this wan light, even trees seem groundless. In a while it will be night, but nothing Here seems to believe the relief of darkness.





DEACONS

Annual Congregational Fall Festival

September 8, 2024

Come and join us in the courtyard of Forest Hill Church following the service on Sunday, September 8th! The Deacons are planning a festive afternoon of fellowship for you to enjoy spending time with old friends and meeting newcomers! This will include a delicious picnic with fun and games for children of all ages.



SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Forest Hill Church met on June 26, 2024. Pastor John Lentz was the moderator of the meeting. The meeting was called to order by Pastor Lentz and opened with prayer.

Pastor Lentz led all in reading the Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve Living into individual gifts Connecting with and across ministries, and Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.

Following this, Pastor Lentz presented the third and final Boundaries Training class.

The pastor asked that Session approve the serving of champagne on July 24, 2024, at the meeting of Session, as part of a celebration and remembrance during this final meeting to be moderated by him. Session approved this request.

The Financial Report for the period ending May 31, 2024, was received.

The Endowment Committee recommended the following addition to our Endowment Policy: As payout amounts are based on a 12-quarter rolling average, newly established named endowed funds are to become active twelve quarters after their establishment. Named endowed funds are considered established once their balance reaches a minimum of \$10,000. Session approved this recommendation.

The Endowment Committee also recommended the creation of a named, endowed fund to honor John and Deanne Lentz. The Lentzes have been consulted and graciously accepted this proposal. They are considering the naming and purpose. The precise naming, purpose and announcement of the fund will occur later. Session approved this recommendation.

The Endowment Committee approved \$63,430 in grant requests submitted by Session. The \$16,000 difference between what was requested and what was approved by the committee represents support for operating expenses. The Committee asks Session to review this matter in the fourth quarter of the fiscal year and then request a grant based on an amount that reflects year-end conditions.

Melanie Alban reported that the FHC Policy Manual will undergo a comprehensive review and revision in the coming months. It was last updated in 2017, and policy changes since that time have been approved and implemented but not incorporated into the written document

Personnel Committee - Melanie Alban, who serves as one of the co-chairs, is stepping off the Personnel Committee at the end of June. She will continue in an advisory role for a short period of time. The remaining members have committed to continuing through the year's end. The committee has undertaken a significant recruiting effort in addition to its ongoing work. The Personnel Committee brought the motion to confirm the committee's decision to continue with the Co-Chair leadership model. For now, Lia Clement will lead as Co-Chair while the committee recruits and develops new members. Session approved this motion. Session expressed appreciation and gratitude for the work of the committee and the leadership of Melanie.

The Transitional Pastor Search Committee (TPSC) presented the Transitional Pastor Position Description and the Terms of Call (developed by the Personnel Committee). Elders thanked the committee for their faithful work and appreciated that the documents were thoughtful and reflected the vision, mission and aspirations of the church. Several suggestions for improvement to the position description were made. Session approved the Terms of Call, as written, and the Position Description, as revised.

During an open discussion some elders expressed concerns and reservations about the process for selecting people to serve on the TPSC as well as the future Pastor Nominating Committee. There were also concerns for the make-up of the committees as not being representative of the diversity of the congregation, both in terms of demographics and theological viewpoints. The Pastor and the Nominating Committee talked about the process and reiterated that Session elders as well as congregants have been and are always welcome to provide input and recommend people to consider. The Nominating Committee will report on their work at each future meeting of Session.

Trustees reported that the Immigration Task Force plan to continue to make the sanctuary apartment available for immigrants and refugees has been subjected to both legal and liability reviews. The church attorney sees no issue with continuing this practice. The church's insurance company does not see any need to make changes to the current policy.

Adult Spiritual Growth reported on the Listening Sessions and the thoughts and feelings offered by congregants around the retirement of the pastor and the transition. The results will be shared with congregants.

Each ministry was asked to consider how to address the concerns and comments that fall within their respective missions. Additional Listening Sessions will be planned for later in the year.

Pastor Lentz reported that he has been in conversation with Elizabeth Hamilton of Holy Cow! Consultants (HC!C) about the potential for additional work to support transition planning. HC!C is open to further discussions with Session to plan the work, if needed.

Pastor Lentz also reported on the plans for worship through August 25, 2024. Guest preachers have been confirmed. A guest preacher is being sought for September 1. The Worship Ministry will continue to recruit communion servers and lay leaders for worship.

He also proposed a plan for continuity beyond his retirement, until a pastor (Gap or Transitional) is in place. He recommended that church issues be managed by:

- Melanie Alban/Lia Clement issues related to staff; Melanie will chair the weekly staff meeting;
- Jeff Smith issues related to Trustees, legal issues;
- Elizabeth Shaw issues related to Session.

All three people will answer to Session. Session approved this plan.

The meeting of Session closed at 9:30 PM with prayer by Pastor Lentz.

JUSTICE MINISTRY

The Justice Ministry is pleased to announce the organizations who will receive Community Grants for the year 2024-25. We received 15 requests for a total of \$ 36,500.00. Since our total budget was \$21,515.00 and all of the requests were deserving, we had to make difficult decisions.

Grants were awarded to the Alliance Against Human Trafficking, Americans Making Immigrants Safe (AMIS), University Settlement, North Presbyterian Church, Eastside Citizens Empowerment Foundation, Honesty for Ohio Education, Cleveland Mediation Center, Abundance Food Pantry, Showing up for Racial Justice, Homeless Stand Down, Racial Equity Buddies, International Ministries (to support Christy Lafferty's work in Nicaragua), and Black on Black Crime's Man to Man Project.

These projects reflect our commitment to Matthew 25 principles in that they are focused on strengthening congregational vitality through ties to community justice work, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty. Bible Fellowship Beyond Sunday Morning



Why Biodiversity Matters

Another word that has entered into our routine vocabulary in the past two decades is "biodiversity," concurrent with global warming/climate change. We all recognize the poster child, the polar bear, whose life is threatened with the thinning and melting of sea ice. Another is the decline of monarch butterflies due to the scarcity of milkweed, their preferred feed on their migrations to/from the north down to Mexico to winter over.

Climate change and global warming threatens the mass extinction of many species of plants and animals, especially ocean life. There are those who would scoff at the idea that we cause extinction threat, pointing out the end of the dinosaur era as the best example, which science has mainly shown to be a natural (i.e. God-made?) example. But in millennia since, it is not God, but man who has been chiefly responsible for species extinction, through habitat destruction and overuse of resources. The elimination of the iconic marsupial carnivore, the thylacine in Tasmania. eradicated by the sheep herder homesteaders in the last century, is a good example. We in America did in the passenger pigeon, and almost put an end to our national bird, the bald eagle, and the American bison (buffalo) in the guise of eliminating the indigenous peoples who relied on the buffalo for all their needs.

Maintaining biodiversity is important throughout the world. Birds, insects, and butterflies pollinate our fruits and vegetables. Fish and animals feed the world's peoples. Scientists are discovering new secrets to health in animals that exist in their DNA—peculiar



resistance to viruses and diseases whose analysis may identify remedies to diseases in human life. Even the most "marginal" creatures may harbor useful information to better life in planet earth. And we can say, as Christians, that it is in God's plan for us to continue to make these discoveries.

The bottom line of conservation and maintaining biodiversity is: all living beings are God's creation, which we need to maintain.

The Cleveland Heights Meals on Wheels program delivers a hot and cold meal four times a week to Cleveland Heights senior citizens who would benefit from meal deliveries.

The organization is run by volunteers who deliver the meals on weekdays (except Tuesday) between 11:30am and 12:30pm and provide a friendly greeting.

The cost is \$7.25 per day, and clients have the option of receiving a frozen meal on Monday that can be eaten on Tuesday.

The hot meal includes a meat, vegetable, and side dish, and the cold meal includes a sandwich, salad, fruit, and dessert.


