

CLE CONCIERTO CONCERT

Early Music Ensemble Debuts at Forest Hill Church!

On Friday, September 27, 7:30pm, my baroque ensemble CLE Concierto makes their debut at Forest Hill Church! The concert program, "Perspectives: Élisabeth Claude Jacquet de La Guerre and her Musical Circle," highlights the circumstances female composers faced in 17th-century France. A lineup of superstar musicians will grace our stage. Musicians include Apollo's Fire concertmaster and assistant director Alan Choo (baroque violin), with Apollo's Fire MOSAIC Fellow Andréa Walker (soprano) and Principal cello René Schiffer (baroque cello). I will play the harpsichord in this program.

I was inspired by traditional concert programs titled "Bach and Sons," "Handel and Friends" etc. Why, I thought, should the emphasis be on these same old people? I was intrigued and started research on music by composers whose stories were not often told by the mainstream. There were many of them, who were once lauded for their accomplishments but generally fell to oblivion because of their gender or position in society.

This was the story of how my ensemble, CLE Concierto, was born. It is not just another music group; it is a movement. The name was inspired by the Spanish word "concertar," which means "to come together in harmony." CLE Concierto seeks to identify composers whose stories are often unknown today, and to connect audiences to their lost worlds and perspectives. We place them on the same concert program as the masters we know so well in dynamic performances of their music.

Tickets are available on <u>CLEConcierto.</u> com. Accessibility is a cornerstone of CLE Concierto's philosophy, with "Pay-What-You-Can" tickets available to ensure that everyone can experience our performances live. We also gratefully accept donations to ensure that we can continue to offer "Pay-What-You-Can" tickets to the community.

I would appreciate any support from you in this burgeoning project. Please feel free to stop me in the hallway to talk about it, bring a friend or neighbor with you to the concert on September 27, or even offer a hug as I embark on this musical journey!

An Invitation One-Day Volunteer Opportunity: Habitat for Humanity Faith Build Saturday, November 16, 9:00am-3:00pm



The Habitat for Humanity Faith Build began in 2015 with the goal to bring faith groups together to help uplift the work of affordable housing. This year, the Faith Build home will be in the Buckeye-Woodhill neighborhood as part of our 400 Home Initiative. This is the 15th home built through the program.

Who is Habitat for Humanity?

Habitat for Humanity is an international nonprofit organization with the overall mission to eliminate homelessness and substandard housing worldwide.

What is the Faith Build?

Faith Build began in 2015 with the goal to bring faith groups together to help uplift the work of affordable housing.

What will I be doing?

You will volunteer alongside Habitat Staff and longtime volunteers to build a home for a qualified Habitat family. You do not need any special skills - just kindness!

Location

This year, the Faith Build home is at 10522 Crestwood Avenue this year. Depending on where we are in the build, you may work at a neighboring Habitat house on the same street. Once you sign up via Volunteer Hub,

we will confirm your volunteer site several days in advance.

Typical Construction Day

- 9:00am—Arrival, prayer, safety orientation, sign-in, and joyful work.
- 12:00pm—Lunch. We ask that volunteers bring their lunch (plan a potluck with your team).
- 12:30-3:00pm—More joyful work, clean up, and reflection. All abilities are welcome. Please know that every task you help with aids in building a home for a family. Some tasks may seem small, but they are all important.

Volunteer Information

- If you have a folding chair, bring that along. Depending on where we are in our progress, we may not have traditional seats available.
- Bathrooms: Bathrooms fluctuate between port-o-lets and functioning bathrooms in the house.
- Parking: On-street parking is available, but space is limited. Consider carpooling.
- Ages on Construction: 16 years or older. 16-17 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Clothing: Wear closed-toed, puncture and slip-resistant shoes. Wear comfortable clothing that you do not mind getting dirty. We work in all weather conditions. Raincoats/ponchos and layers are good ideas.
- Thank you and have a safe, fun, and fulfilling day!

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Forest Hill Church met on July 24, 2024. Pastor John Lentz was the moderator of the meeting. The meeting was called to order by Pastor Lentz and opened with prayer.

Pastor Lentz led all in reading the Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve Living into individual gifts Connecting with and across ministries, and Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.

Following this, Pastor Lentz led a discussion of an article titled "The Urgent Need for Justice-Oriented Churches in the United States: Embracing Sankofa at the Margins," by Rev. Dr. Elizabeth D. Rios.

The elders of Session asked the pastor to briefly leave the room. They then discussed and approved the granting of the title of Pastor Emeritus to Rev. Lentz, upon his upcoming retirement.

The discussion of the Financial Report for the period ending June 30, 2024, was postponed until the August meeting.

Session examined and joyfully welcomed Carol Smith into membership. Carol has been a faithful and active congregant for many years.

The Transitional Pastor Search Committee reported that the job description for the position of Transitional Pastor, previously approved by Session, was reviewed and approved by the Committee on Ministry of the Presbytery of the Western Reserve. It now has been distributed in multiple ways and the search process is underway. It is anticipated that the process will take several months so the committee recommended that Session seek a Gap Pastor for September and October. Session approved this recommendation.


The Clerk of Session reported that Rev. Carol Wedell was approached, informally, to see if she was interested in serving as Gap Pastor. She currently serves as Parish Associate and has been active in Forest Hill Church for many years. She expressed interest in being considered for the position. Session approved offering the position to Carol. An ad hoc committee was established to work with Rev. Wedell and the Personnel Committee to develop terms of employment. The expectation is to present the terms to Session for review and approval at the next meeting.

The final actions of the meeting were remembrances and celebration in honor of Pastor Lentz as he prepares to retire.

The meeting of Session closed with prayer by Pastor Lentz.

The Racial Repair and Restoration Task Force of Forest Hill Church has invited the Rev. This program was approved by Session and presented to the congregation several months ago.



Why Biodiversity Matters

Another word that has entered into our routine vocabulary in the past two decades is "biodiversity," concurrent with global warming/climate change. We all recognize the poster child, the polar bear, whose life is threatened with the thinning and melting of sea ice. Another is the decline of monarch butterflies due to the scarcity of milkweed, their preferred feed on their migrations to and from the north down to Mexico to winter over.

Climate change and global warming threaten the mass extinction of many species of plants and animals, especially ocean life. There are those who would scoff at the idea that we cause extinction threat, pointing out the end of the dinosaur era as the best example, which science has mainly shown to be a natural (i.e. God-made?) example. But in millennia since, it is not God, but man who has been chiefly responsible for species extinction, through habitat destruction and overuse of resources.

The elimination of the iconic marsupial carnivore, the thylacine in Tasmania, eradicated by the sheep herder homesteaders in the last century, is a good example. We in America did in the passenger pigeon, and almost put an end to our national bird, the bald eagle, and the American bison (buffalo) in the guise of eliminating the indigenous peoples who relied on the buffalo for many basic needs.

Maintaining biodiversity is important throughout the world. Birds, insects, and butterflies pollinate our fruits and vegetables. Fish and animals feed the world's peoples.



Scientists are discovering new secrets to health in animals that exist in their DNA—peculiar resistance to viruses and diseases whose analysis may identify remedies to diseases in human life. Even the most "marginal" creatures may harbor useful information to better our life on planet Earth. And we can say, as Christians, that it is in God's plan for us to continue to make these discoveries.

The bottom line of conservation and maintaining biodiversity is: A ll living beings are God's creation, which we need to maintain.

HEIGHTS TREE PEOPLE



Heights Tree People is a volunteer organization working primarily in Cleveland Heights and University Heights. The majority of their work is supplying and planting trees in residents' front yards for FREE.

How does it work when a resident requests a free front-yard tree from them? When a resident requests a tree, the group usually makes a short visit to view the yard and talk with the residents about the type of tree they'd like and where it would go. Once that is decided, they will return, plant the tree, and leave instructions about its care—specifically that it needs to be watered regularly in the summer during its first two years in its new home.

Trees provide many benefits to people and neighborhoods:

- Trees make neighborhoods not only more beautiful but also healthier, safer, and cooler.
- People are happier and healthier when they live with trees.
- With trees, stress levels go down, as do stress-related diseases, including heart attacks, strokes, anxiety, and depression.
- Studies have shown that crime, including domestic violence, is lower in neighborhoods with good tree canopies.
- Neighborhoods are more stable, and property values increase where there are plenty of trees.
- Trees cool houses and clean the air, so they reduce respiratory diseases.
