

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WORDS FROM THE REV. DR. GENE MCAFEE

These are the sorts of questions any church in

FHC's position would be asking right now. It's been eight months since John retired, two months since the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) was approved at the congregation's annual meeting, and there hasn't been much news about the search for a new pastor lately. With the assistance of Elizabeth Shaw, Clerk of Session, let me give you an update.

In March, Session met for an all-day retreat that included a refresher on the transitional process from the Rev. Arvid Whitmore, our liaison to the Committee on Ministry of the presbytery. As Arvid reminded us, the transitional process for securing new pastoral leadership in PCUSA churches has three discrete components:

- securing transitional pastoral leadership;
- producing a Mission Study Report (MSR) to inform the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC); and
- assembling and supporting the PNC as it examines ministerial profiles of and interviews prospective candidates.

Each of these steps requires months of work, and all three are underway.

The Rev. Carol Wedell provided pastoral

leadership during the gap period between the end of summer pulpit supply and my arrival in January, so step one is in the bag.

Step two, producing a Mission Study Report, began with Session's decision at its January meeting to appoint a Mission Study Committee (MSC) to undertake that work on Session's behalf.

The MSC will consist of four to six members - drawn from the PNC and members of the congregation at large - with one of those four to six members serving as liaison with Session. Invitations and responses are being exchanged between Session and the congregation (including the PNC) now, with the hope that the MSC will be formed and announced within the next couple of weeks. Jennifer Blakeney, Scott Lafferty, Jean Reinhold, and Elizabeth Shaw were authorized by Session as an ad hoc committee to prepare the MSC slate. As is standard practice for all nominating processes, the names of individuals approached for service are confidential.

Once the MSC is formed, it will draw on various resources, including conversations with the congregation and church consultants, to produce its Mission Study Report. The Committee will

- look at the church's history and values,
- examine the populations that we serve and how cultural shifts impact our church life and mission,
- develop a vision for our future,
- examine roles, responsibilities, and relationships of our leadership as we carry out our mission, and
- assess financial health and stewardship.

That process will take a few months. [cont'd p. 4]

Finally, step three, the examination of candidates by the PNC, will begin after the Mission Study Report has been approved by Session and the presbytery's Committee on Ministry. While regular updates on the PNC's progress will be provided to Session and the congregation, the names of candidates must remain confidential. That process will also take some months.

So that's where we are in the transitional process, FHC: assembling a Mission Study Committee to produce the Mission Study Report that will inform the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee. Things are moving along, pretty much as they should.

Meanwhile, the mission and work of the church continues to go forward with the support and leadership of dedicated congregants, ministries, and groups, for all of whom I am very grateful.

FAMILY FAITH EVERY DAYStrengthening Faith Practices at Home

Families in our congregation who have children ages birth to three are invited to join an exciting new project that is designed to strengthen faith practices at home.

Forest Hill is one of 17 congregations in the U.S. and Canada chosen to participate in a three-year program called Family Faith Every Day, a comprehensive initiative designed to nurture faith practices in families with young children. Family Faith Every Day is funded by the Christian Parenting and Caregiving Initiative of the Lilly Endowment Inc.

Amy Wheatley, the program director, will be inviting parents of young children (ages birth to three) to participate in parenting circles that will meet eight times during the coming year. In our gatherings, we will learn simple, meaningful faith practices that can be incorporated into daily life at home and share feedback on our use of these practices. Parenting circles will also provide an opportunity to build connections and community with other Forest Hill families.

We are grateful (and excited!) for the opportunity to partner with Family Faith Every Day to strengthen and expand our ministry to families of young children. SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve Living into individual gifts Connecting with and across ministries, and Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.

The Session of FHC met on February 26, 2025. Pastor Gene McAfee was the Moderator.

The Call Process - Sharon Core, General Presbyter, Presbytery of the Western Reserve (PWR), and Arvid Whitmore, Committee on Ministry, PWR, gave a presentation on the transition period and the process of calling a new pastor for the church following the retirement of Pastor Lentz in 2024. The major steps are:

- 1. Select a transitional pastor, (Completed in December 2024, via an agreement executed with Pastor McAfee)
- 2. A Mission Study Committee to develop a Mission Study. The components of a Mission Study include church identity, context for ministry and purpose and planning.
- 3. After the Mission Study is approved by both Session and the PWR, the Pastor Nominating Committee carries out the search and call process for a new installed pastor.

The Financial Report for the period ending January 31, 2025, was received.

Steve Sedam, Chair, Endowment Committee, introduced the FHC Endowment, including the

purpose, relationship to Session, endowment value, spending rule, funds available for 2025 and process of selecting and approving grants. Aspirations for 2025 are:

- Working cooperatively with Session, the Endowment Committee will apply the 4% spending rule to allocate funds for special projects and critical budgetary needs of the church in 2025.
- In cooperation with the Stewardship Ministry, expand awareness of the FHC Endowment and planned giving opportunities to support FHC in perpetuity.

Justice Ministry reported that the Immigration Task Force has drafted a policy for Immigration Control Enforcement (ICE) Encounters. The draft includes guidelines on complying with laws, responding to ICE visits and notifying appropriate FHC authorities.

Trustees have re-established a team to review safety and security procedures for the church. This is a continuation of work that was started several years ago but paused during the COVID pandemic.

Session agreed to form a Mission Study Committee. A small group will review recommendations from Session, develop a list of candidates, invite four to six people to be on the committee and present the slate to Session for approval.

ADULT SPIRITUAL GROWTH (ASG)



Atonement: Reimagining God's Will for Reconciliation March 23-April 6, 9:15-10:15am Meet in South Hall or join virtually

During Lent, we contemplate the mystery of God's human presence in Jesus, Christ's sacrifice, and the path to renewing and restoring a close relationship with God. Christians (and others) have used the word "atonement" to describe how the breach between God and humanity can be mended, but it's a word that is hard to define and even harder to understand. We have thought about, described, and squabbled over what atonement means, how it happens, and how to apply it to our lives for two thousand

years. It is at the core of our understanding of the meaning of the incarnation and the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, but we may not engage directly with this challenging idea. This three-part series will address the desire and need for restoring our relationship with God, how the idea of atonement has been expressed and believed over the centuries, and will conclude with an exploration of new ways of thinking about God's love, mercy, and presence as we prepare for Good Friday and Easter morning.

Scriptural Contemplation April 13 and 27, 4:00-5:00pm, in the chapel

We will read a selection from the lectionary for the following week with brief periods of silence followed by sharing and praying for each other. This has been a very beautiful spiritual and connecting experience. Sharing a simple song in our acoustically awesome chapel adds to the experience.

KING! JACKSON!: A MUSICAL

Racial Equity Buddies are pleased to once again partner with Leonard Di Cosimo, President of the Cleveland Federation of Musicians, AFM Local 4, to present to the community — free of charge — the musical *King! Jackson!*, followed by a jazz concert!

The *King! Jackson!* musical explores the friendship and partnership between Mahalia Jackson and Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Jackson was an American gospel singer, widely considered one of the most influential

vocalists of the 20th century and a close friend and confidant of King.

Mahalia shouted to Dr. King and changed history. Dr. King's prepared remarks for the March on Washington did not include nor reference Dr. King's dream. While King was delivering his remarks, Mahalia shouted and exhorted, "Tellthem about the dream, Martin!" Trusting Mahalia's instincts implicitly, King put aside his text and launched into "I Have a Dream," which would become his most famous speech. Without Mahalia, there would not have been that speech, not that historic day!



Dealing with Plastics

We all know what a pollution problem for the environment is a result of discarding used plastic articles. The following information, created by Tom Denbow and our friends at Church of the Covenant, says it all, with suggestions on reducing home usage.

What Can Members Do to Reduce Home Plastic Use

Facts About Plastic Waste

Only about 9% of all plastic produced gets recycled, which means the rest is sent to landfills or ends up as litter, all too often ending up in our lakes and streams. This not only pollutes our environment, but also poses a significant threat to wildlife. While changing the use of plastics in our households can feel overwhelming, taking small steps to decrease our choices involving plastics will help reduce demand and associated pollution.

Making a small change to reduce plastic waste can make a big difference over time, benefit our ecosystem, and help stem climate change!

- Every year, 500 billion plastic bottles are produced globally.
- There are more than 150 million tons of plastic waste in the ocean.
- By 2050, ocean plastics will likely overtake the number of fish.
- In 2020, we generated more than 500 million tons of plastic waste, 900% more than in 1980.
- Single-use plastics have an average useful life of 12-15 minutes and can take up to 500 years to disintegrate.

Ideas for Reducing Home Plastic Use

- Take a cloth bag when you go shopping. If you must use plastic, see if you can substitute paper bags or make sure you recycle plastic bags (most grocery stores accept them).
- Shop at a local farmers market. Farmers markets are a great way to buy fresh, local produce without plastic, as long as you remember to bring your own cloth bags.
- Replace plastic containers with glass or steel or aluminum containers.
- If you use plastics (especially bottles, tubes, etc.), please recycle them according to your local recycling services.
- Avoid cosmetics that use microplastics (<u>https://freeappsforme.com/free-skin-careingedients-checkers/</u>).
- Buy "natural" fabrics like cotton, hemp, and linen. Processing these materials is far less water-intensive than synthetic fabrics like polyester and nylon, and they will last longer and reduce microplastic generation, which ends up in our streams and Lake Erie.

- Buy less clothing and wash clothes only when necessary. A single wash can cause 700,000 bits of microplastics to be released into the environment.
- Use a refillable water bottle; steel or aluminum bottles are best.
- Use DIY cleaning products—use a mixture of one part vinegar and three parts water as an all-purpose spray cleaner (storing it in a reused spray bottle). Other options: https://www.thespruce.com/diy-household-cleaners-8672198.
- Try natural beeswax-coated cloth wraps instead of plastic cling film (https://www.beeswrap.com/).
- Compost food waste to avoid plastic garbage bags.
- Switch to shampoo bars and bar soap; liquid soaps require plastic containers and use more energy.
- Go with metal razors and shaving soap (wood handle bristle applicator); it is more expensive but lasts much longer and reduces the use of plastic disposable razors and throwaway toothpaste tubes.
- Rethink your deodorant; when possible, buy deodorant that comes in biodegradable, compostable, or recyclable packing.
- Choose wooden combs; they are hard to find but out there.
- Swap out your plastic toothbrush and use a bamboo brush with natural fibers.
- Switch to silk dental floss, which usually comes in plastic-free packaging.
- Use dry toothpaste to reduce the number of plastic tubes that must be thrown out.
- Switch to chewable mouthwash, although be careful—products can't be swallowed.
- Use natural sponges; most are plastic; walnut or coconut sponges are good alternatives.
- · Switch to laundry strips, although be

careful—some use plastics as a backing for the soap.

The fundamental biblical mandate for creation care comes from Genesis 2:15, where God places Adam in the garden to "till it and keep it" (NRSV). A better translation from the Hebrew is "to serve it and to preserve it." In Genesis 1:26–28, God blesses humankind with dominion over the earth. Human "dominion," as intended in Genesis, is best practiced in care for creation. In Christ, "all things hold together" (Colossians 1:17), and "every creature under heaven" is to receive God's good news (v. 23). According to Revelation, God's work in the world is to "make all things new" (21:5), to bring about a new creation that does not destroy the old but transforms it, renews it. If the church is the sign of the new creation, then the church must lead the way in caring for creation.

REMINDERS ABOUT SCAM EMAILS AND TEXTS

This is a reminder to be cautious of any email or text that looks suspicious. If it appears to come from a church staff member, but it's from a phone number or email address that you don't recognize, it's probably a scammer. Please read the email address carefully, and not merely the sender's alleged name. If an email appears to come from a church staff member, but the email address is not their official staff email address, it doesn't mean the staff member has been hacked; it means a scammer is pretending to be them.

Scammers try tactics such as: asking you to secretly send money or gift cards, asking you for personal information, and asking for a copy of the church directory. If you receive such a request that is not part of an authentic ongoing conversation with someone you know, it's a scam.

Another church put together this message of things to watch out for:

"Scammers often try to get you to click on links in text messages or emails by promising you something. Scammers might:

- promise free prizes, gift cards, or coupons — but they're not real
- offer you a low or no interest credit card
 but there's no deal and probably no card
- promise to help you pay off your student loans — but they won't
- send fake messages that say they have information about your account or a transaction — but they don't
- say they've noticed some suspicious activity on your account — but they haven't
- claim there's a problem with your payment information — but there isn't

- send you a fake invoice and tell you to contact them if you didn't authorize the purchase — but it's a scam
- send you a package delivery notification
 but it's fake"

"The messages might ask you to give some personal information — like how much money you make, how much you owe, or your bank account, credit card, or Social Security number — to claim your gift or pursue the offer. Or they might tell you to click on a link to learn more about the issue. Some links might take you to a spoofed website that looks real but isn't. If you log in, the scammers would steal your username and password."

Please remember that if an email or text looks suspicious, it probably is. Let me know if you receive such an email or text so that I have data about how often it is happening. You can email me at churchadmin@fhcpresb.org.
