

PASTOR'S COLUMN: TERRA BEATA

I don't know if "What I Did on My Summer Vacation" is still a feature of returning to school for primary-age children, but one of the things I did with my summer vacation last month was to meet a young Christian in Lorain whom I will likely never meet again, and that's okay. Our meeting, providentially provided, was the result of his whistling and my recognizing.

Greg, my friend from Houston, Chloe, my beagle mix, and I were walking near the jetty in Lorain Harbor on a Saturday morning. I heard someone whistling the familiar and beloved hymn, "This Is My Father's World," and it turned out to be an undergraduate in Harvard College who was visiting two of his friends in Lorain. He was lying on his back, looking up into a beautiful summer sky, and having an experience of God's creation that must have paralleled the experience that Maltbie D. Babcock had had when he was inspired to write those well-known words celebrating God's creation in the 1880's.

As our shadows fell across the young man's face, he stopped whistling and looked up at us, and so I asked him, "What church do you go to?" and now it was his turn at recognition. He smiled, sat up, and engaged Greg and me in a wonderful conversation for the next twenty or so minutes. He was thrilled to know that Greg and I had both attended Harvard Divinity School and that both of us had worked for Harvard College. He was even more pleased to learn that we are both ministers. His plans to become a medical doctor sprang directly from his faith that God calls each and all of us to service in God's beautiful world – "terra beata" in Latin, the name of the tune to which "This Is My Father's World" is sung.

As Greg and Chloe and I walked away, I said to Greg that none of us could have seen that coming, that none of us could have planned that encounter as part of our vacation, and yet meeting that young man – I'd forgotten his name before we left the jetty – turned out to be one of the high points of our trip to Lorain.

Clubs, sororities, fraternities, secret societies, underground and resistance movements – they all have their own codes, symbols, signs, rituals, and insider language for members to communicate with each other. The church, I was reminded, also has ways for its members to communicate with one another without using words.

As the clouds continue to gather in this time of fear-driven confusion, uncertainty, and cold-heartedness, we will need to be listening for God's voice calling to us in the kindest, simplest, and most open-hearted of ways – in a whistled hymn tune, for instance. As Babcock put it in his hymn, "That though the wrong seems 'oft so strong / God is the ruler yet." Embedded in that beloved hymn celebrating God's creation is the unyielding affirmation of a pillar of our Reformed faith – that regardless of who is in charge of our or any other human-made government, God is still in charge of God's "terra beata," God's beautiful world.

Children begin the morning in worship with their families and leave the sanctuary with their adult leaders following the Children's Welcome.

11:20am Children's Gathering (Education Wing Classrooms)

We gather to build friendships and

community! We share joys and concerns over snacks. We create art, play games, write puppet shows, or build with Legos as we explore the stories of God's people. We think about how we can live as followers of Jesus in our homes, at school and in our community.

Middle School and High School Youth (6th through 12th Grade)

MISSION STUDY COMMITTEE

The Mission Study Committee needs your help! Pastor Gene dedicated his July Tower article to the transitional process of new pastoral leadership with a focus on the Mission Study Committee (MSC) and its members. The MSC, along with guidance from Arvid Whitmore representing the Presbytery of the Western Reserve, has been charged with capturing a snapshot of Forest Hill Church. The end product, the Mission Study, contributes to the Nominating Committee's creation of a Ministry Discernment Profile – think the church's "resumé" – which is then viewed by potential pastoral candidates.

While some of the Mission Study includes objective information such as a brief history of the church, membership demographics, and church finances, the most important aspects of the study will come from engaging you, the congregation of Forest Hill Church, in focusing on three main components:

- 1. Identity Who are we as a church?
- 2. Context for Ministry Who are our neighbors?
- 3. Purpose and Planning What is God calling us to do?

When we as a people face a present and future that stirs doubt, fear and anger, we turn to many sources of wisdom and influence to decipher our times and discern a path forward. As people of faith, we look for God's word wherever we think we can hear it. But we are not the first troubled generation, and our Scriptures contain stories of those who faced crises and looked to God to make sense of where the world seemed to be going, and to find purpose and hope. At the same time, many of us remain insulated in our day to day lives from calamities both near and far. Our Scriptures also show us God's word to the comfortable. The words of the Biblical prophets remain a timeless witness to both of these yearnings, as much today as when they were first recorded. This fall we will study the texts of three of those prophets - Amos, Micah and Habakkuk - as both compelling insights into the Jewish communities into which they spoke and as words that echo into our own times. 

Dancing in the Darkness: Spiritual Lessons for Thriving in Turbulent Times by Otis Moss III

Michael Eric Dyson writes the foreword, which should whet your appetite to read the book and join the discussion.

"A young lady was complaining to her mother about her troubles... The mother led her daughter to the kitchen and filled three pots with boiling water. In one, she placed raw carrots; in the second, a raw egg, and in the third, coffee beans".

The mother, upon removing each from the pots, noted: "The carrots had been strong, hard, and unbending, yet emerged soft and weak. The egg had been fragile, its liquid interior protected by a thin shell, and yet its inside was hardened by the heat. The consistency of the coffee beans remained the same, but instead of being altered by their surroundings, they changed the water in which they were boiled to produce coffee with a rich aroma... Which are you?" the mother asked.

Dyson uses that story to explain the African American experience in America. He writes:

"Black folks have been coffee bean people who practice a black coffee spirituality. We have throughout our history been thrust into various bodies of hostile water - into the Atlantic during the slave trade, and in the case of the young martyr Emmett Till, into the Mississippi's Tallahatchie River. And each time we have transformed waters of hatred and brutality into healing streams of moral and social redemption...

"Black folk have consistently proved to be coffee bean people who change the character of the cultures we inhabit, transforming a nation built on violence and bigotry into a land flowing with wild aspiration to make the dream of justice a steady truth...

"Like the coffee bean, Black folk have added flavor and fragrance to a society often bitterly opposed to Black intelligence and humanity. Black spiritual striving has pushed America closer to becoming a nation inspired to close the gap between its noble ideals and its too often sorry practices. Black people have spilled blood in the soil of American society, and from that soil has sprung a more vigorous imagination about the possibilities of democracy. In this book, Moss beautifully shares the contents of a robust and reflective black coffee spirituality that can once again save the soul of America, with prophetic grief, sober redemption, catalytic forgiveness, baptized rage, edifying emancipation, sublime justice, and majestic hope."





NEWS FROM THE CAMERON LIBRARY



Many of you may have noticed the book cart by the Adult Spiritual Growth Bulletin Board. The goal is to make materials from the library more accessible to those are not able to go down to the library. The Camerons purchased the cart, and Ann Donkin assembled it. Currently it is housing giveaway items that are duplicates in the current collection. Feel free to make selections. In mid-September those items will be donated and replaced with items from the collection to check out. There will be pens and a box for the checkout cards. The collection will rotate to keep a fresh look.

Another generous purchase by the Camerons is a new printer that will allow adding of titles, date due card labels and call number labels to be done in house. Ann Donkin ordered the printer and Dan Shaner installed it on the network. The Mac computer in the library has a guest profile that allows people doing a search in the library to find additional sources and information. It can even be used to order materials from Clevnet.

The library is undergoing some changes and that's a good thing. The collection has been checked to be sure the titles that are recorded are actually in the active collection. Relatively few titles were missing and after checking against what was checked out, the librarians are confident that our list matches what is on the shelves. Our next step is to add the first three letters of the author's name to the

call number to make it easier to locate books within a particular section.

We are also interested in updating the collection. While some sources never go out of date, others on topics like social issues, sexual identity, and others change. That said, we are always looking for donations of books less than five years old and without handwritten notes. If you would like to donate books, audiobooks, or DVDs to the library, please set them in the basket under the table to the left of the door as you enter the library.

Air and water pollution are plagues on a healthy earth environment, and they affect all of us creatures who inhabit God's creation. Very fortunately we in northeastern Ohio are blessed with better air and water quality, and a minimum amount of pollution, than many, many other parts of our country and the world have as a whole.

It is well known, and documented scientifically over several decades, that unfettered emissions of such industrial emitters are directly associated with chronic health concerns such as increased pulmonary disease, asthma, cancers, and other health defects in people exposed to and living in close proximity to such firms.

In America, the Clean Air and Water Acts, and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have had historically positive effects on countering man-made pollution from industrial sources — refineries, chemical plants, coal burning power plants, cement plants and others, as well as from our vehicles. But the current administration wishes to weaken existing protections by reversing

the EPA'S own 2009 finding that greenhouse gas emission pollution is a threat to human health and safety. Indeed, the government now wishes to grant a pass of exemption to 200+ chemical firms to not have to comply with established air quality standards.

The Environmental Defense Fund (EDF) and other responsible NGOs are actively combating such negative actions legislatively and in the courts as they previously have when complying with air and water quality standards have come under attack from specific polluting plants and industry associations.
