

PASTOR'S COLUMN: THERE'S A KIND OF HUSH

If you're now humming to yourself a pop song from 1967 by Herman's Hermits... well, let's just say that you're no longer young. And that's totally groovy.

Winter officially begins at 10:03am on Sunday, December 21, but creation's quiet season is already upon us. Around these parts, we had our first snowfall overnight between November 11 and 12, and some serious squalls popped up through midday. And that meant that things slowed down. And when things move slowly, they often move quietly (not always, but often). Once the high winds subsided, the world grew quiet. Most of us stepped gingerly at first, until we figured out what treachery, if any, might lie concealed beneath the fallen flakes; the snow had begun as rain, after all. Most of us pressed more gently on the accelerator. The dog and I took a late-night walk to enjoy the crispness and the quiet; most folks were tucked in by then. There was a kind of hush, and it was delicious.

December can be loud. The jingling of store music, the chatter of plans, the rush of end-of-year everything — it fills our ears and calendars until even joy starts to sound like noise. Business and busyness stomp the stuffing out of tranquility.

But when you look closely at the first Christmas story, there's a surprising amount of silence. Zechariah is struck speechless. Mary "ponders these things in her heart." Joseph listens to a dream. Shepherds watch the night sky before anything happens. Even heaven holds its breath before the angels sing.

Maybe silence isn't the absence of Christmas spirit. Maybe it's the doorway to it. That's the

kind of hush the world is perhaps looking for without knowing it. It's nothing to be afraid of, nothing ominous, nothing void of sound but filled instead with the still, small voice of holiness.

What if this December we didn't fill every gap with words or sound? What if we treated quiet as sacred space — a pause long enough to notice God slipping into the world again, softly, like breath on a cold night?

In that silence, we might finally hear what the carols are trying to tell us: that love has come, that hope is born again, that peace is possible. Not loud, not flashy — just quietly real. Definitely not the entrance runway at many of today's wedding receptions.

So this month, before you hit "play," "post," or "reply all," try stopping for a moment. Listen for the holy hush beneath the noise.

That might be where Christ is waiting for you. Thanks, once again, to the Rev. Liz Nau and her heroic efforts on our Celtic Spirituality Pilgrimage to help us recover the blessed presence of silence.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve Living into individual gifts Connecting with and across ministries, and Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.

The session met on October 29, 2025, in a Stated Meeting. Pastor Gene McAfee served as moderator. The following is a summary of the meeting.

The Financial Report for the period ending September 30, 2025, was received.

The contract with Pastor McAfee for the full-time position of Transitional Pastor was approved for a six-month extension with an effective period of January 1 through June 30, 2026. Annualized Terms of Call also were approved.

The Racial Repair Task Force, having completed its work of establishing and funding the FHC Education Relief Program, was retired. In its place the Education Debt

and Relief Committee was established under the Justice Ministry, to continue this important work.

Session approved a recommendation from the Deacons to remove Libby Dolan from the membership roll after receiving her request to do so.

Session also discussed several items, including the ongoing work of the Nominating Committee, a draft antiracism policy, support for two PC(USA) initiatives that focus on LGBTQIA+ matters and the need for leadership as well as volunteers for the Black History Education Committee.

The meeting closed with prayer by Pastor McAfee

New and Continuing Opportunities to Build Faith and Community

Our Christian faith is a relationship with God that grows and changes over a lifetime. That growing spiritual maturity is built upon these foundational pillars — sermons, individual and devotional Bible study, prayer and community (small group fellowship). The Ministry of Adult Spiritual Growth seeks to provide the congregation with Sunday morning educational hour Bible study, and at other times, in various ways. Tom and Kathryn provide in-depth Bible study, and we have created other opportunities to use Bible-based studies in a variety of ways.

Conversation in community opens us up to insights and connections that are not achieved within individual devotional study or even sermons. Bible and Bagels, which meets each early Wednesday morning online, provides such a community, as does Contemplative Scripture Study which meets at 4:00pm on Sunday afternoons twice a month. Feel free to join either or both.


ASG is expanding our offerings to a series of four- to six-week studies that may be easier to fit into your busy schedule. As with all our offerings, we hope folks will come regularly to build relationships. But, these series will not build on subsequent material, so come as you can. In either case, you will find opportunities for growth in your faith journey.

Starting January 2026, the following classes will be provided.

- 1. Tom Zych and Kathryn Eloff will lead a 12-week Bible study in South Hall on Sundays at 9:15am. The topic will be Paul's first and second letters to the Thessalonians.
- 2. Bible and Bagels and Contemplative Scripture Study will continue. See AGS bulletin board for details.
- 3. Holy Conversation will be a four-week class built around the theme of HOPE. No preparation is needed. No lesson is built upon the other. The class will meet at 9:15am in Fellowship Hall.

PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE AFTER HURRICANE MELISSA



Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is responding to Hurricane Melissa, which made landfall as a Category 5 hurricane in Jamaica, also striking Cuba and other island nations on its path through the Caribbean.

Initial assessments show catastrophic destruction around the core path of the storm, and throughout the impacted region, devastating flooding and debris are isolating communities in several of these island nations. Along with loss of life, livelihoods and shelter have been destroyed. It will take years to recover.

After initial needs are addressed, PDA

will remain — working alongside partners throughout the affected islands to support long-term recovery, resilience for leaders and communities, and addressing unmet needs.

TO BUILD OUR COURAGE: TRAINING TOUR

Sunday, December 7, 1:00-4:00pm Lee Heights Community Church (4612 Lee Rd.)

Mennonite Action is offering a training session for ongoing organizing against ICE and working for peace and justice in Palestine.

Join the training on Sunday, December 7, 1:00-4:00pm to develop tools and frameworks that will help us respond in courage during this historical moment, "discerning the times" as we are called to do (Matthew 16:3). The training will be led by Mennonite Action volunteers who are traveling across the US on a Build Our Courage tour. The event will include trainings on noncooperation, grassroots organizing, and mutual aid, in addition to spending time worshiping in prayer and song and of course a meal together somewhere in there, too.

The training will leave you with a better understanding of how we can work together to: organize against ICE, work for peace and justice in Palestine, and resist genocide and an authoritarian takeover.

Mennonite Action is a movement Mennonites, Christians, and friends following in the example of Jesus Christ, who called us to live as active peacemakers, standing firmly on the side of the downtrodden and the oppressed. Mennonite Action formed in November 2023 and since then has organized and led public action against the occupation of Palestine. Activities they have organized include a 135-mile "All God's Children March for a Ceasefire" to DC, "Send Aid, Not Bombs" campaign, and virtual meetings of people across the country to educate, strategize, and pray. SUPPORT FOR NORTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Churches in the Presbytery of the Western Reserve partner with North Presbyterian Church, 4515 Superior Avenue, in Cleveland, to serve the needs of inner-city Cleveland. As a partner in 2025, Forest Hill Church provided a community grant, and our Labre volunteers prepared and served meals to North congregants on the fourth Sunday of each month.

Many of North's congregants are temporarily homeless, in transitional housing, or are housing insecure. They attend from two of neighborhood's largest homeless the 2100 Lakeside shelters: of Lutheran Metropolitan Ministries and Norma Herr Shelter of the YWCA. Many lack basic personal hygiene and clothing items such as those listed here.

Please consider making a donation from the list during the next month. Beginning Sunday, November 2, there will be a container in the Joyce Hunter Foyer (near the information table) to receive your donations. The last day to receive your contributions will be Friday, December 5.

On December 6, volunteers from the partner churches will gather at North to put together care packages for distribution in December and to learn more about homelessness in Cleveland.

Appreciating Wetlands

Oceans and seas, lakes, rivers, and streams are well-known to us. Less known are "wetlands." Wetlands can often

be considered as quiescent "still waters," a singular combination of water and vegetation adjacent to larger water sources, as well as to smaller lakes, ponds, streams and reservoirs.

There are several different kinds of wetlands that have developed and exist in Ohio. They include palustrine wetlands such as swamps (forested wetlands), wet prairies (emergent wetlands), coastal and embayment marshes (emergent wetlands), peatlands (wetlands that have organic soils), and wetlands along stream margins and backwaters.

Why are wetlands environmentally important? Wetlands are crucial for the environment because they provide clean water, protect against floods, and are essential habitats for biodiversity. They act as natural filters, removing pollutants and improving

water quality. They also protect against floods by absorbing excess water and buffering against storms and erosion. Furthermore, wetlands support a vast number of flora and fauna species and play a role in combating climate change by storing large amounts of carbon.

There are several important wetlands right here in northeast Ohio. Cuyahoga Valley National Park has over 1500 wetlands, and many wetlands exist within the Lake Metroparks. There is also Mentor Marsh in Lake County, and in Geauga County, there are the Grand River Lowlands, including Morgan Swamp, and Burton Wetlands Nature Preserve. Many of these locations are available to the public for visitation to learn about and appreciate their role and value in the environment.

In many instances, land development by industrial or even residential concerns often intentionally obliterates these natural watershed wetlands to achieve "progress." For environmentalists and conscientious earthcaring individuals, however, such "draining the swamp" is most often not a good idea!

RACIAL REPAIR AND RESTORATION TASK FORCE UPDATE


At its October 29th meeting, Session approved the recommendation of the Racial Repair and Restoration Task Force to formally retire the Task Force and, in its place, establish a new committee: Education Debt Relief, which will now operate under the umbrella of the Justice Ministry.

The Education Debt Relief Committee will:

- 1. Continue to educate the Forest Hill Church congregation about the program
- 2. Publicize the program and seek new recipients as each loan is paid off
- 3. Select future recipients
- 4. Submit annual funding requests to the Finance Committee
- 5. Ensure that the designated endowment funds approved by Session are contributed annually to the program

We are deeply grateful to all who supported the Racial Repair initiative over the past year. Your generosity has made a meaningful impact, and we hope you will continue to support this important work moving forward.

In 2026, we will issue the second and final installment of the grant to Natasha Lovelace, which will nearly exhaust our current funds.



Our goal is to continue raising donations with the hope of selecting and supporting a second recipient by no later than 2027.

As we move into this next chapter, please note: on the memo line of your check, kindly write "Education Debt Relief" instead of "Racial Repair."

On New Year's Eve, do you ever find yourself kind of tired from all the busy-ness of the holidays, but still wanting to do something to ring in the New Year?


Then bring your favorite party game, and your favorite dish to share for a Multi-Generational Potluck Game Night here at Forest Hill!
