PASTOR’S COLUMN: RISEN FOR ALL CREATION

Many years ago, when I was a young graduate student in Hebrew Bible, one of my most esteemed professors delivered a lecture at Princeton Theological Seminary that was subsequently published as “The Redemption of Nature.”

The thesis of that lecture and article was that we human beings are redeemed with nature, not from nature. The “rocket ship” model of salvation, so pervasive throughout Christian history (and prominent today in secular conversations about the colonization of other planets), is a narrow and ultimately defective understanding of the scope of God’s redeeming love.

We are accustomed, perhaps too accustomed, to hearing the good news of Easter in narrowly human terms: Christ is risen — for us. Our sins forgiven, our mortality overcome, our hope restored. All of that is true, and it is no small thing. But it is not the whole thing.

The witness of Scripture pushes us further, wider, deeper. The resurrection of Jesus is not only about the redemption of human souls; it is about the renewal of all creation.

The apostle Paul dares to say in Romans that “the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains,” waiting — not just for human salvation — but for liberation. And in Colossians, he goes even further, proclaiming that in Christ, God is reconciling all things — whether on earth or in heaven. Not some things. Not only people. All things.

This is a startling claim. It means that Easter is not just a spiritual event; it is a cosmic one.

If the cross reveals the depth of God’s solidarity with suffering, then the resurrection reveals the breadth of God’s commitment to renewal. Nothing that God has made is outside the scope of God’s redeeming love. Not forests or oceans. Not endangered species or polluted rivers. Not even the parts of creation we have forgotten how to love. All are part of the Beloved Community so precious to Forest Hill Church.

For people of faith, this matters. It reshapes how we understand both faith and responsibility. It helps us grasp the inescapable fact that every day is Earth Day.

If resurrection is for all creation, then creation itself is not a disposable backdrop to the “real” drama of human salvation. It is part of the

story God is telling. The earth is not merely the stage; it is among the beloved.

This challenges the habits — enculturated in western consumerism — of domination and extraction that have so often accompanied human life, sometimes even justified by distorted theology. Seeing creation as part of God’s plan of redemptive love invites us instead into a posture of kinship and care. We are not separate from creation; we are participants within it, bound up in its flourishing or its suffering. As Dr. King said, “Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere,” and ecojustice is a real thing.

Easter, then, is not only a promise about life after death. It is a summons into a different way of living before death — a way that aligns with God’s renewing work in the world.

To proclaim “Christ is risen” is to say that death does not have the final word — not over us, and not over the earth. The stories of the risen Jesus Christ do not portray the disciples as being immediately sent out with a strategic plan to missionize the known world. Instead, Jesus meets them in ordinary places at walking pace: on roads, around tables, by the sea. He listens. He cooks them breakfast. He invites them to trust that the Spirit will come in due time and that it will come to them here, on God’s good earth, where the work of redemption is so desperately needed.

A Christmas Gift in Every Key: Our Fellowship Hall Piano Story

The search for an upright piano in the fellowship hall turned out to be a story full of surprise, generosity, and a little holiday magic.

It began when Ying happened upon an extraordinary find in an unlikely place, in a used piano warehouse in East Cleveland. There, sitting quietly amid the dust and dozens of used instruments, was an almost brand-new Boston Steinway upright piano. Despite its pristine condition, the instrument was listed at just \$2,250, which was a remarkable value, considering that new models can cost up to \$20,000.

After thoughtful discussion in several worship and music ministry meetings, a decision was made: this was an opportunity too meaningful to pass up. The piano would be purchased using Friends of Music funds, with a commitment to raise the money afterward.

Then came an added blessing! The piano was delivered on Christmas Eve. What better gift

could there be for our church community than music waiting to be shared?

Fundraising efforts quickly followed, led with enthusiasm and creativity, especially with help from Kris Fay. Announcements during worship services spread the word, while fellowship hour became a lively hub of “piano-playing” (and occasional enthusiastic “piano-bashing!”) by members of all ages. The joy was contagious, and so was the generosity.

Thanks to the outpouring of support, we not only met our fundraising goal, we exceeded it. The additional funds will continue to support the Friends of Music ministry and future musical opportunities.

We are deeply grateful to everyone who contributed, participated, and cheered us on. Because of you, this piano is already becoming a vibrant part of our shared life together.

This newest member of our community will serve many purposes in the years ahead: enriching fellowship hours, adding warmth to receptions, inspiring impromptu party-playing, supporting choir rehearsals, and accompanying small group gatherings, youth activities, and community events.

Sometimes the right instrument finds its way to the right home; ours certainly did.

CAMP LILAC



Camp Lilac is an overnight summer camp for transgender and gender-diverse youth ages 13–17. Forest Hill Church has supported Camp Lilac ever since the first summer of operation in 2017. In the context of the current hostile political climate

for transgender people, Camp Lilac needs continued support, just as much as or even more than in the past.

In the summer of 2026, Camp Lilac will have two 1-week sessions, July 19–25 and July 26–August 2. Along with the campers, almost all the staff members are transgender or gender diverse. The week-long program is designed to help the campers to gain confidence in their identities and to build community, both during camp and at home.

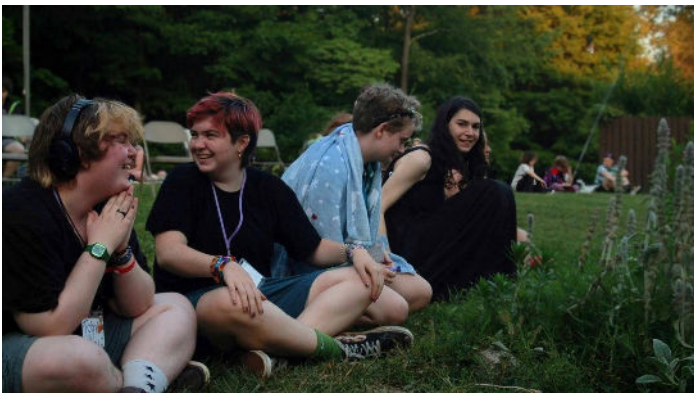
A day at Camp Lilac begins early and is filled with campers' choices of activities. These can include typical summer camp activities like swimming, hiking, archery, and arts and crafts. Camp Lilac also offers a few activities that celebrate transgender identity,

such as tutorials on hair care, makeup, and voice training for the camper's preferred gender. Campers can also choose to focus on participating in Quests, activities that build skills over several days in a row. Evening programs typically involve participation in all-camp activities like a bonfire, a variety show, capture the flag, or a dance party.

Feedback about Camp Lilac has been very positive from ALL of the groups who help create the camp – campers, staff-in-training (age 17), counselors and other staff (age 18 and up), camp nurses and parents of the campers.

Before coming to camp, many campers did not know any transgender peers and had never met a transgender adult. But at camp, they get to know an entire community of transgender people. Staff members often tell us that they take great joy in providing experiences that they wish they could have had growing up. And parents tell us that they see their kids feeling happy, confident, and accepted for the first time in years.

Transgender kids are like ALL kids: Beyond the needs related to their transgender identity, we also see the side of our campers that is simply kids having fun. In the words of the Camp Director, Nora Mahon, "The media and many conversations about trans kids [cont'd on p. 15]"

focus almost solely on their transition, but this is really just one small part of them. Just like any other kids, they need opportunities to play, to make friendships, to make mistakes and learn from them. It's the context of the world, the politicization of their identities, the barriers to care, etc., and not their transition itself, that gets in the way of this.”

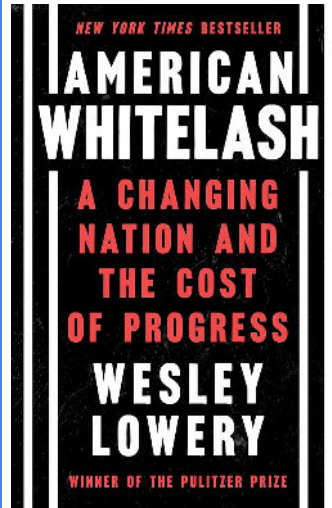

NEWS FROM NORTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Forest Hill Church (FHC) is a partner congregation supporting North Presbyterian Church, 4515 Superior Avenue, in the St. Clair neighborhood of Cleveland. Our partnership is essential to North's ongoing outreach ministries. Church attendees come from the surrounding neighborhood as well as Lutheran Metropolitan Ministries' Men's Shelter on Lakeside Avenue and the YWCA's Norma Herr Women's Shelter. These are low-barrier shelters, so often church attendees are among the most vulnerable members of the community.

FHC, through our LABRE program, prepares and serves lunch following worship on the fourth Sunday of each month. A number of volunteers have served soup as part of North's partnership in Old Stone Church and Edwin's Stirring Up Hope. Several others have led Bible study at the men's shelter. Earlier this year, FHC members contributed hygiene items and winter apparel in response to special appeals. In recent years, North Church has received

community grants via the Justice Ministry. Our continued support empowers North Church to serve the most vulnerable.

On Saturday, May 30, from 5–7 p.m., North will hold its second Gala Art Auction and Music Concert. The sanctuary will be transformed into an art gallery, music hall and silent auction space. More than 40 artists have donated their work and three bands are scheduled to perform. Proceeds will benefit the music program at North Church. 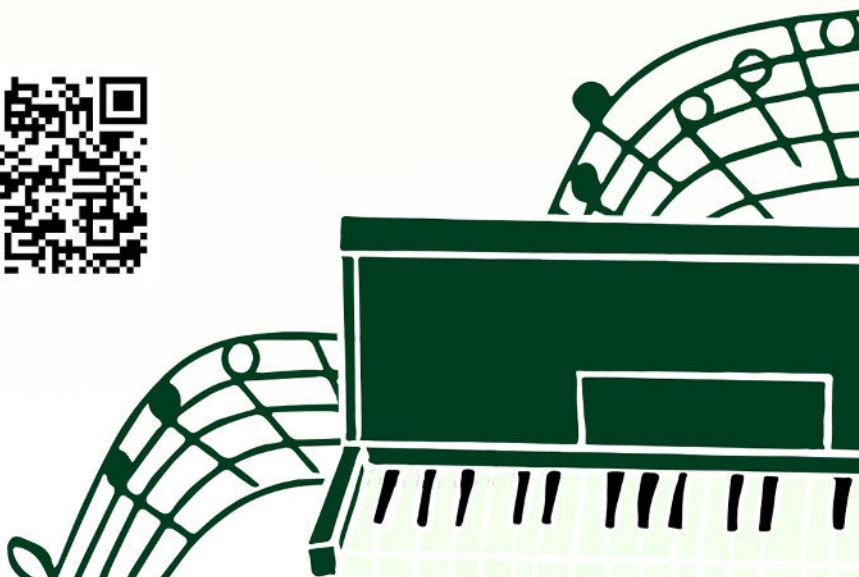

EARTH CARE CONGREGATIONS



EPA and ESA

The Environmental Protection Act (EPA) and Endangered Species Act (ESA) are two of the most important and recognizable governance mandates of the environment that Earth-caring peoples have embraced for several decades.

Unfortunately, both the EPA and ESA are under heavy attack from the current administration, which promotes exploitation and profits over public good. Water and air pollution continue unabated with increased mineral extraction, industrial manufacturing and emissions, and protections for wildlife habitats are disregarded.

While we can encourage our individual congressional representatives to support good practices within the EPA and ESA, it is much more effectively beneficial to promote and participate with various non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to gain traction. Earth Justice, Natural Resources Defense Council, Center for Biological Diversity, Defenders of Wildlife, Nature Conservancy, and many others, provide much more clout in Washington through their large paid legal staff, substantial fundraising activities, and legal challenges to the administration on actions which are environmentally detrimental. In many

instances, such formidable legal challenges put forth by the NGOs have resulted in administrative reversals leading to environmental benefit.

A current item for action which we as Earth-caring individuals can undertake involves the Endangered Species Act, which helps protect God's fellow creatures. Our national Presbyterian organization, PCUSA, is encouraging all Earth Care Congregation church members to contact their congressional representatives to oppose the following House bill which seriously impacts the Endangered Species Act.

H.R. 1897, sponsored by Rep. Bruce Westerman, contains numerous provisions that would drastically weaken the Endangered Species Act, our most effective law to protect biodiversity and prevent the extinction of our most vulnerable animals, fish, and plants. Nearly all species listed under the ESA have been saved from extinction and hundreds are on the path to recovery today. As the climate crisis continues to threaten the biodiversity of Creation, we must do all we can to protect all creatures who are at risk. 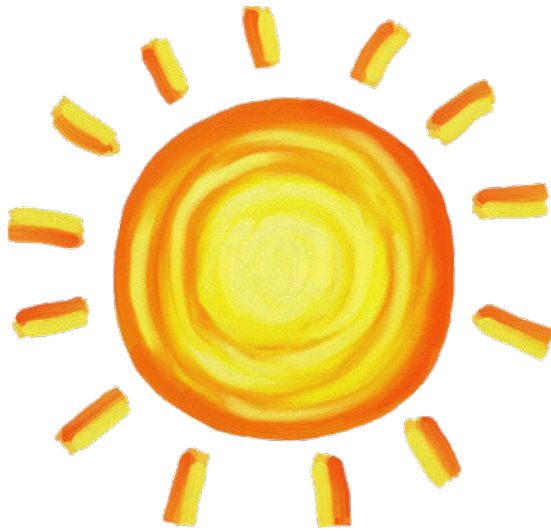

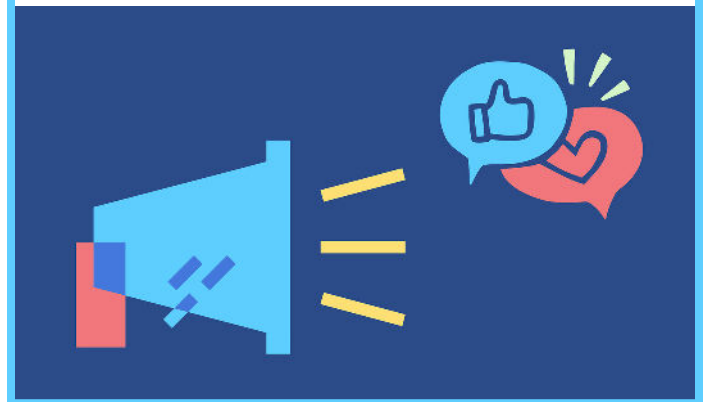
