WORDS FROM THE REV. CAROL WEDELL



At the end of September Jean Reinhold and the Stewardship ministry led worship with the theme, “Now More Than Ever, We Are The Church.” Indeed, we are! The key part of that sentence for me is “we” – all of us. Whether or not you’ve picked up your fun, new blue t-shirt, I have a favor to ask of you – all of you. Obviously, your pledge of time and treasure is vital to our congregation’s future. So, if you haven’t turned in your pledge, I urge you to do so. Along with that, I want you to do something else.

I want you to think about who you haven’t seen recently. If you have been worshipping from home, or perhaps have been absent for a while, you have lots of folks to choose from! If you are primarily confined to home, I hope you will still consider giving someone a call, if that is possible for you. YOU matter!

If you’re in worship most Sundays, I’m guessing there are folks that you have wondered about. Haven’t seen someone in a while? Curious about how they are doing? Is everything OK? How are they handling this time of transition?

Here’s how you find out. You pick up the phone and give them a call. It’s that simple. (If you don’t know their number, you can look it up in Breeze, or if all else fails, call the church office or me!) Can you imagine what would happen if every member of Forest Hill called at least one other person for no reason other than to see how they were doing? What if you called MORE than one person? If you know that someone has been ill or is going through a tough time, it’s even more important that you reach out to them. That’s being the church. If a call or visit from me (or whoever follows me) is helpful, let me know.

You don’t need to be best friends to call; just genuinely interested in their well-being. And if someone calls you, welcome the opportunity to reconnect. Thank them for calling. And then think about who YOU can call!

GRANT RECIPIENT FOR FAMILY FAITH PRACTICES

Forest Hill Chosen to Participate in National Program to Strengthen Family Faith Practices



We are delighted to announce that Forest Hill is one of 17 congregations in the U.S. and Canada chosen to participate in a new program called Family Faith Every Day, a comprehensive initiative designed to strengthen faith practices in families with young children. This program is aimed at empowering parents and caregivers to incorporate simple, meaningful faith practices into daily life.

Primary funding for the program comes from Lilly Endowment, Inc., with additional support through the Atlantic School of Theology. Rev. Traci Smith, Program Director, and Rev. Dr. Dave Csinos, Research Director, will provide program leadership, with financial support, printed resources, and coaching designed to help the congregations lead family faith formation initiatives within their communities.

“We know that nurturing faith in young children starts at home,” said Smith. “Through this program, we are equipping congregational leaders to train parents and caregivers to integrate faith practices into their daily routines. These practices will strengthen family bonds, deepen spiritual connections, and create lasting traditions that can be passed down through generations.”

Program Details:

- **Three-Year Commitment:** Forest Hill will receive up to \$15,000 over three years to support family faith initiatives.
- **Peer-Learning Cohorts:** Amy Wheatley, Director of FYC Ministry, will participate in a peer-learning cohort and receive

training, coaching, and opportunities to collaborate with other leaders across diverse theological backgrounds.

- **Parenting Circles:** We will create and lead parenting circles, helping parents and caregivers implement faith-based practices in the home. The parenting circles will use a custom curriculum based on Chalice’s Faithful Families series, written by Smith.
- **Research and Evaluation:** Csinos will lead the cohort’s research arm, evaluating its effectiveness in developing and sharing the lessons more broadly.

Forest Hill, chosen for our commitment to fostering family faith practices and our readiness to engage in this transformative journey, will also receive workbooks, training materials, and access to a faith-formation library to support our ongoing efforts.

We are incredibly grateful (and excited!) for the opportunity to partner with Family Faith Every Day to strengthen and expand our ministry to families of young children. During the next two months, we will provide more information about the program and invite families to participate in parenting circles that will begin in the new year.

Fun at the Jazz Hymn Sing

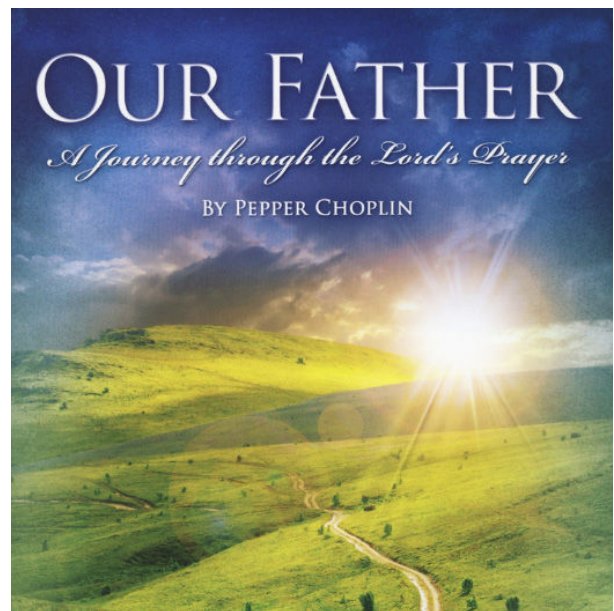

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session of Forest Hill Church met on September 25, 2024. Rev. Eileen Vizcaino was the moderator. Rev. Vizcaino was previously approved by the Committee on Ministry, Presbytery of the Western Reserve, to serve as moderator. The meeting was called to order by Rev. Vizcaino and opened with prayer.

Rev. Vizcaino shared a reading from *Carry On* by John Lewis and invited all to join in a spiritual conversation.

Session received a letter from the Peters Family pledging \$10,000 to support the new Educational Equity Program in memory of Graham Peters who was a devoted member of the church for 66 years. Session expressed thanks for the service of Graham and gratitude for this contribution.

The Financial Report for the period ending July 21, 2024, was received.

The Transitional Pastor Search Committee reported on the continuing work to search for and call a Transitional Pastor.

The Nominating Committee reported on the ongoing work to discern, seek and call people

to fill leadership positions in 2025.

The Family, Youth, and Children Ministry reported that participation continues to be high with much excitement for the activities of the new church year.

The Justice Ministry is working with Racial Equity Buddies to invite congregants to a post-election gathering on November 12 in support of building community together.

The Stewardship Ministry has kicked off their campaign with a goal to receive 200 pledges, an increase over the 175 received last year.

Session offered thanks to Eileen for serving as moderator.

The meeting of Session closed with prayer by Rev. Vizcaino.

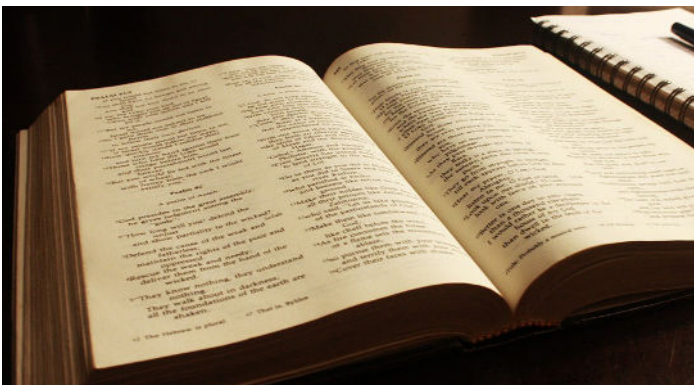


**New Class Offering for Advent!

EARTH CARE CONGREGATIONS

Positive Earth Care Potpourri



We are knowledgeable about many negative issues regarding Earth Care — recycling, greenhouse gas emissions, ocean and water pollution, global warming, climate change, aggravated natural disasters, etc.

Time for some positive news:

- A new Public Lands Rule will give equal priority to non-destructive uses, such as recreation, wildlife, and nature conservation as to “development” uses.
- The EPA has restricted six toxic “forever” (non-degradable) chemicals from drinking water, but must withstand chemical industry and water utility pushback.
- A new bill bars development of a megamine in Alaska which affects salmon runs and living conditions of indigenous peoples in the headwaters of Bristol Bay.
- Vermont becomes the second state to ban use of neonic pesticide-treated agricultural products, which have been found to kill pollinators such as bees.
- The Interior Department under the current administration has proposed massive protections for the Arctic Reserve, affecting wildlife and the lives of over 40 indigenous peoples.
- The EPA has issued new pollution-control standards to both coal- and natural gas-fired power plants, which would substantially reduce toxic element emissions.
- Within just a few months, the MethaneSat satellite will be in orbit and will identify methane leakage from refineries and

chemical plants, and also perhaps from “factory meat farms.” Methane has far more warming power than carbon dioxide in contributing to global warming. Methane polluters will be identified and hopefully will correct these methane “escapes.”

Needless to say, positive actions to protect our earth must withstand challenges by opposing forces who seek to overturn regulations and governmental actions. Whichever political party wins/gains executive and legislative powers, it will be necessary for vigilant Earth Caring citizens to continue to advocate for positive actions for the Earth and all peoples.

RECYCLE ELECTION YARD SIGNS

We can all play a part in making our community a better place by VOTING and helping the environment!

After you have VOTED in the election on November 5, bring your used campaign yard signs to Forest Hill Church for recycling. Yard signs can be placed in the designated collection box in the Hunter Pavilion through Sunday, November 17.

Campaign signs of all kinds will be taken to the Cuyahoga Solid Waste District. Materials are recycled by Northcoast Recycling Specialists in Wickliffe. The plastic is marketed to compounders that convert the material into pellets for making items such as plastic bags and plastic toys. Paper is sent to a fiber recycler. The metal is recycled through a local scrap yard.

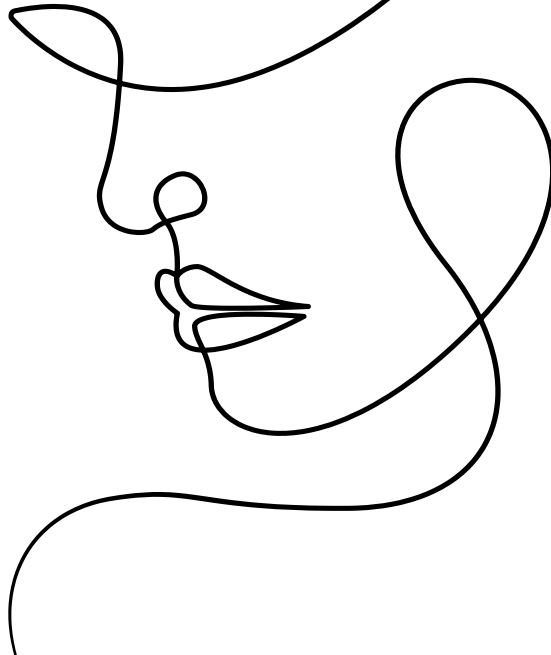

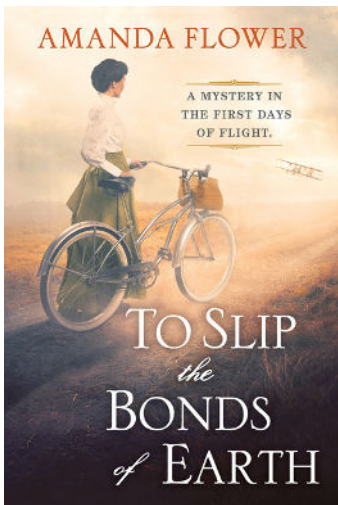
P.E.O. HOSTS MYSTERY AUTHOR AMANDA FLOWER
