

Let's Talk About It

One of the things that ranked high on the list of wants members of FHC reported to the Holy Cow! consultants was the opportunity to come together

in small groups for meaningful conversation with the sharing of food.

This year's Lenten program at FHC is a response to that desire for community

building and nurturing over a meal. We get to know one another better when we share our stories in meaningful ways—what matters to us and not simply what we did with our day and communal meals have always provided a perfect setting for those meaningful conversations. There will be three meal-andservice Lenten opportunities this year at FHC, all focusing on our spiritual lives and practices.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, which falls on March 5 this year. There will be a service in the sanctuary at 7:00pm, preceded by a meal in Fellowship Hall at 5:45pm. Bring a pot of your favorite soup or a loaf of your [cont'd p. 3]

favorite bread-there will be a sign-up sheet to provide balance—and enjoy the company of others who have decided to observe the season of repentance and renewal.

Midway through Lent, on March 19, we will gather again in Fellowship Hall at 5:45pm for a soup-and-bread dinner and discussion. Following a brief evening devotional service, Danielle Cosgrove will facilitate small group discussions on our spiritual journeys and practices. We are seeking three men to bring soup and anyone to bring a loaf of bread. Please sign up if you will share these gifts with our community gathering.

Our third Lenten opportunity to share food, fellowship, and worship will be on Maundy Thursday, April 17, when we will gather in Fellowship Hall at 5:45pm for a simple breadand-soup potluck followed by a Service of the Upper Room and Tenebrae. Families are especially encouraged to attend this gathering, as the kinetic and sensory experiences of the Lord's Supper and the extinguishing of lights provide ample opportunity for participation by even young children.

Other Lenten observances, such as the ecumenical Good Friday service, will help to shape our experience of Lent, but I wanted to bring these three in-house events to your attention especially, since they will give us a chance to build on the work done by the congregation with the Holy Cow! Consultants.

All of us crave and need companionship. Lent is a journey that invites company; we want to talk about what makes our lives full and rich and blessed as well as those areas in our lives where we know we have room to grow. Repentance and renewal go hand-

in-hand for a healthy Lenten observance. Hearing from one another about our spiritual lives, our spiritual practices, and our spiritual disciplines provides all of us with a valuable resource for growth and nourishment. I hope you'll join us as we journey together through Lent.

Join Ying's partner, Irwin Shung, as he guides listeners through a colorful Lenten recital accompanied by compelling narration and arresting visuals.



Franck's "Prelude, Chorale, and Fugue" is the very stuff of revelation.

Overtly religious, it opens with visions of brooding despair but ultimately transcends to the heights of ecstasy in its final moments.

By contrast, Rachmaninov's virtuosic "Ten Preludes, Opus 23" are steeped in lush, romantic worldliness; yet even within this opulent landscape, fantastical apparitions emerge at unexpected moments. The climax of the "First Prelude in F-sharp Minor" culminates in a cataclysmic and profound loss of faith, while the final movement, in enharmonic G-flat major, lifts us to the stars.


Family Lunch with Pastor Gene Sunday, March 2 12:15pm in Fellowship Hall

Young People's Study with Pastor Gene



The Faith of Jesus Sundays, March 9 and 16, 9:30-10:30am, Room 104, for young people in grades 6-12

Jesus was Jewish. How do we know this?
Why is it important?
What does it mean for those of us who call ourselves his followers?

Pastor Gene McAfee will lead two sessions with our young people to investigate the Jewishness of Jesus and why that matters for Christians. We will begin with the evidence from the Bible and trace the historical paths that led to what one scholar has called "the reluctant parting" of Christianity from Judaism. We'll learn about the "Judaisms" of Jesus' day and some of the practices associated with them. By understanding Jesus' faith better, we may come to understand our own faith better as well. As Philip said to Nathanael, "Come and see!" (John 1:46)

On Sunday mornings in February, children attended worship with their families, helped serve communion; sang with Ms. Julie; learned and played with friends in Sunday School; and participated in a Black History month reading of *Born on the Water*.























SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve Living into individual gifts Connecting with and across ministries, and Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.

The Session of FHC met on January 15, 2025. Pastor Gene McAfee was the Moderator. Pastor McAfee invited all to join in singing Hymn #307 – God of Grace and God of Glory. The lyrics are reflective of the current times for our church leadership, encouraging all to seek wisdom and grace.

The Financial Report for the period ending December 31, 2024, was received.

The Finance Committee presented the proposed budget for 2025. The budget included

a total income of \$834,117 which included annual gifts, church rental, endowment support and other support. Expenses included pastor and staff compensation, building and grounds expenses and ministries, totaling \$834,177. After discussion, Session approved the budget.

Session approved the formation of a Mission Study Committee (MSC) as a part of the process of calling a pastor. The MSC will have four to six members and report to Session. The report of the MSC must be completed and approved by both Session and the Committee on Ministry, Presbytery of the Western Reserve before the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee can begin.

Scriptural Contemplation March 9 and 23, 4:00-5:00pm, in the chapel



HONORING THE LIFE AND WORK OF THE REV. DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

A Community Forum Saturday, April 5, 10:00am-1:00pm North Church Presbyterian 4501 Superior Ave., Cleveland

This event will be a powerful community gathering honoring the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. through music, discussion, and action. The program includes live gospel music, a panel on Dr. King's unfinished work, interactive breakout sessions, and a closing drum circle to inspire collective action.

The date is significant: Dr. King was assassinated on April 4, 1968. This gathering is a robust call to action—blending culture, knowledge, and community to honor his legacy and advance his fight for equity and justice.

We begin with uplifting spiritual and gospel music to set the tone. A thought-provoking panel follows, exploring Dr. King's unfinished work and its impact on Greater Cleveland today. From there, we move into interactive breakout sessions to reflect, strategize, and find ways to take meaningful action. Each group will share key takeaways before we close, as we began, with culture—this time, a drum circle to embolden and energize us as we carry forward the work of justice.

A continental breakfast will be served from 10:00-10:30am as part of the program.



Our drum major for justice, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., not only stood with the poor, oppressed, and marginalized—he was treated as one of them. We strive to revive that spirit within ourselves, acting boldly in the solidarity and justice he exemplified.

Honor MLK by Demanding Real Change. Dr. King knew that justice requires more than words it demands radical structural change. He spoke unapologetically about systemic writing racism, in A Testament of Hope (1969), "White America must recognize




that justice for Black people cannot be achieved without radical changes in the structure of our society." In Stride Toward Freedom (1958), he reminded us, "True peace is not merely the absence of tension; it is the presence of justice. In August 1967, King spoke about the three evils "the sickness of racism, excessive materialism, and militarism.".




BEING SANCTUARY PEOPLE

How Faith-Based Communities Can Respond to the Needs of Immigrants Sunday, March 9, 12:15-2:00pm Fellowship Hall

The FHC Immigration Task Force is offering a timely program of urgent importance, "Being Sanctuary People" for those interested in the well-being of immigrants and eager to be engaged on their behalf. On Sunday, March 9, Dr. Gina Pérez, will speak at Forest Hill Church about her latest book *Sanctuary People: Faith-Based Organizing in Latino/a Communities*. The event includes a meal at 12:15pm followed by the presentation.

Dr. Pérez is a Cultural Anthropologist, Professor and Chair of the Department of Comparative American Studies at Oberlin College. As an author of several books, she describes herself as a scholar, and person of faith. Her latest book,



Sanctuary People has heightened relevance considering the oppressive policies of the Trump administration toward immigrants.

Sanctuary People examines the role that faith communities in Ohio have played in the development, proliferation, and strengthening of sanctuary practices and other forms of organizing connected to Latina/o communities and Latin American migrants. By focusing on efforts to help those affected by immigrant detention and Puerto Ricans displaced in the wake of Hurricane María, Dr. Pérez reveals the ways faith communities, activists, and community leaders are creating new strategies to address the increasingly precarious contexts in which Latina/o people live, and how they are imagining and enacting new forms of solidarity. The story of Leonor Garcia and Forest Hill Church is portrayed in the book as an example.

Dr. Pérez will inform us about the distinct alliances, relationships, and ways of knowing and being that faith-based activists have employed to create places of safety. The role of faith-based organizing in these communities contributes to what Puerto Rican journalist Maria Mari-Narváez describes as the need to "build a more horizontal society, a place for everyone to live and work and love in."

NEWS OF KEMP JAYCOX

For those of you who may be wondering about our good friend Kemp Jaycox, here is an update.

In early January 2025, Kemp moved with the assistance of his wife, Cindy Fink, and daughter, Kate, to the facility in Cincinnati called The Beechwood Home. Kemp had applied to be admitted there several times and for good reason, it is one of the nation's premier long-term residential facilities for persons experiencing neurological disorders such as multiple sclerosis, cerebral palsy, and ALS (or Lou Gehrig's disease).

I was fortunate to visit Kemp in late January and was pleased to see him in good spirits. His room is bigger than the one he had in Parkside Villa, with a scenic view and plenty of light. It is filled with pictures of his friends and family. The staff is very professional and supportive of the residents. Kemp continues to have occupational and speech therapy on a regular basis. His work with the speech therapist involves trying puréed foods with the hope of being able to eat solid food again. A sign of how top rate Beechwood is—some of the staff have worked there for anywhere from 12 to 30 years!

While I was with him, we watched OSU win the national college football championship game with several of his new buddies at Beechwood, all of whom welcomed Kemp with open arms. He gets together with them often



to watch sports, play euchre and participate in other group activities.

Though he

misses the loving community he cherished at Forest Hill Church, Kemp is fortunate to have several friends from his high school days in Cincinnati as well as his parents who live nearby come to visit often. What impressed me most upon seeing Kemp was what impressed me when I first met him. Despite all he has endured, he remains a positive, caring, warm soul with a wicked sense of humor.

What's in Store for This Year?

As we look back on 2024, there were a number of good gains on maintaining the environment during the Biden administration. Too many individual results to specifically name on the local, as well as national, scene. Working with the governmental agencies, two of the most prominent non-governmental organizations (NGOs), the Natural Resource Defense Council and Earthjustice, together with others, brought their legal muscle to bear in fighting off the usual industry-brought challenges to "good works" relating to the environment.

With the new administration firmly in power and wishing to issue executive orders overturning the Biden orders, it is now more important than ever that we must turn to the NGOs with their aggregated financial impact, thousands of supporters, and army of lawyers to continue the fight. Here are the most important issues.

EPA: The new administration will most likely try to slash environmental rules and regulations which govern air and water quality, and side with industry pollutants. At constant risk is the health and welfare of

many populations in dense chemical plant concentrations on the Gulf coast.

ESA: While last year saw gains in protection of the iconic monarch butterfly, wolves and grizzly bears, the Republican dominated states will seek to undue these protections, as well as for other less well-known species.

Energy: The new administration is hell-bent on "drill, baby drill," threatening pristine environments and indigenous peoples in Alaska, ocean population in off-shore drilling, and land desecration through fracking in state and federal lands.

Climate Change: The new administration abhors scientific reality and may intend to do nothing regarding escaped methane and other green house gases which contribute to emissions, including roll-back of acceptable limits.

Clean Energy: Despite the prominence of Elon Musk (Tesla) in the new administration, there is no "mandate" for conversion to clean energy—wind, solar, nuclear power. Many clean energy plans face growing opposition for approval in many parts of the country.

So what should we do? I continue to recommend that we support these NGOs as the best means of adding our voices to many others and let them carry the fight. Contacting individual legislators and requesting action is less likely to achieve any result, whereas the thousands of supporters represented by the NGOs has a much better chance of success.

COMPOSTING STATISTICS FOR 2024

By composting with Rust Belt Riders in 2024, Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian, diverted 1.2 Tons of food scraps from landfills. That created 5 yards of compost, and was the equivalent of 1.1 Tons of CO2e avoided. Carbon dioxide equivalents (CO2e) are a measure of the effect of different greenhouse gases (GHGs) on the climate.

Ohio landfills are significant contributors to methane emissions, and every pound of food scraps we compost helps mitigate this impact. Additionally, by turning waste into nutrient-rich compost, we're supporting local gardens and sustainable agriculture right here in Northeast Ohio, fostering a greener and healthier community for all.
