

- 2. producing a Mission Study Report (MSR) to inform the work of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) IN PROCESS; and
- 3. assembling and supporting the PNC as it examines ministerial profiles of and interviews prospective candidates A FEW MONTHS AWAY.

A couple of weeks ago, you received the good news that six members of the congregation have agreed to serve as the Mission Study Committee (MSC)—the subcommittee of Session that will produce the Mission Study Report. You can see in my <u>previous article</u> some of the specifics that make up a Mission Study Report and how the MSC will go about securing and assembling those bits and pieces. Bountiful participation in the process will help all of us know that we have contributed to the future of Forest Hill Church.

As always, if you have any questions about this process, please speak with me or Elizabeth Shaw, Clerk of Session. We're on our way!



The Session of FHC met on March 26, 2025. Pastor Gene McAfee was the Moderator.

The meeting opened with prayer, followed by a spiritual conversation about the discipline of the Examen. This practice, developed by St. Ignatius, invites one to review each day in the presence of God with thankful reflection on where God is in one's everyday life.

The Financial Report for the period ending February 28, 2025, was received. The cotreasurer also noted that a grant has been

received for the work of the Ministry of Family, Youth and Children.

Session reviewed and approved a new staff position description titled Children's Program Assistant.

Session also reviewed draft personnel policies on ethical conduct and sexual misconduct.

The process for 2025 endowment proposals is underway, one proposal was received and reviewed. The process will continue over the next two meetings.

The meeting closed with prayer.

Repair! Restore! Rise!

A Reception Celebrating Racial Repair to Eliminate College Debt

Join us in celebrating Natasha Lovelace, former Cleveland Heights resident and the first recipient of Forest Hill Church's Racial Educational Debt Repair Award.

This award is the work of the Racial Repair & Restoration (RR&R) Task Force, launched in 2022 to address the deep and lasting impact of systemic racism—specifically the disproportionate burden of student loan debt on Black communities.

After a thoughtful review process involving over 20 candidates, Natasha was selected as a Black female college graduate carrying the weight of educational debt.

WHY IT MATTERS:

- Black graduates carry more student debt on average than any other group.
- This debt limits wealth-building opportunities like buying a home, saving for retirement, or starting a family.
- Black women are especially impacted—earning degrees without closing the income gap.
- This crisis threatens the financial future of millions, as the ACLU and Brookings Institution have reported.







The Power of God

For Earth Day this year, PCUSA Creation

Justice created a program for earth care entitled "The Power of God." God chooses to exhibit power through Jesus—a different kind of King. The gospels reveal to us Jesus' use of power, and that power is meek, peaceful, and kind. Jesus' power is found in the cross. It is the kind of power that transforms dead things into fully alive creatures.

God's power is most clearly seen in relationships, creation, redemption, healing, and renewal. God's power is manifested in the *Bible*, beginning with giving his peoples dominion over all the earth. Modern dominion demands responsible governance, i.e., caretaking, over all aspects of the ecology of life.

What does ecological care by God's people have to do with God? The answer is: Everything. Everything, because what we believe about God's power changes how we interact in the world! What we believe about the power of God changes how we adjust our thermostats, fuel up our cars, commute to work, carry out our jobs, engage in politics, advocate for legislation, shop for home goods, and plug or unplug our many house-hold appliances.

Despite the ravages of nature—and many man-made ecological disasters—we have experienced the power of God in restoration

of waterways, forests, lands and many nearly extinct living creatures when we have taken actions. But we need to do much more!

Personal actions and advocacy are important aspects of personal responsibility for earth care that can make a difference. There are many actions that we can take to address our energy consumption and prudent use of natural resources to minimize harmful greenhouse gas emissions and mitigate the effect of climate change.

Earth Care people support our national initiatives on the EPA, Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, Endangered Species Act, Antiquities Act and other government actions which are essential tools for resisting environmentally harmful extraction projects, protecting the health of communities and ecosystems, and maintaining biodiversity. These foundational policies safeguard the integrity of air, water, wildlife, and culturally significant lands and waters, ensuring that all energy projects, whether extractive or renewable, are subjected to rigorous environmental reviews and public input.

Earth Care people support and advocate for influential non-governmental organizations, such as Earth Justice, World Wildlife Fund, Center for Biodiversity, Natural Resource Defense Council, Sierra Club, Ocean Conservancy, Rainforest Alliance, National Wildlife Foundation, and many others on global, national, state, and local levels that speak to power throughout all levels of government to protect and care for the earth and the environment.

Long live God's Power in all of us to enhance and strengthen his Creation!

PILGRIMAGE TO IRELAND

Celtic Pilgrimage: A Sacred Journey through Ireland Informational Meeting Tuesday, April 29, 7:00-8:00pm Meet in South Hall

Join us for a Celtic pilgrimage to Ireland. Our focus is on sacred Christian Celtic sites associated with mystics/Saints Patrick, Brigid, Kevin, and Columba. We will seek union with their Celtic spirit in the storied landscapes of Ireland. Ours will be a contemplative journey with time of walking, personal reflection, public worship, and Sabbath rest.

Pilgrims are persons who take a journey into the outer world to sacred places seeking transformation of the inner geography of their souls. We will leave home to find Home and to return renewed.

Highlights of the Ireland pilgrimage:

- Visit to the Book of Kells at Trinity College and Dublin Cathedral
- Visit to monastic city of St. Kevin and a walk on the pilgrim path in Glendalough
- Visit to Brigid's Cathedral, Fire Temple and Holy Well in Kildare
- Journey to the ancient site of New Grange, Kells Cathedral, and the Hill of Tara sites of ancient Christian significance
- In Northern Ireland, walking in the footsteps of St. Patrick and his mission at the St. Patrick Centre
- Visit Clonard Monastery and East Belfast Mission—centers of faith and reconciliation in bringing peace to Northern Ireland now and during the "Troubles"
- Coastal pilgrimage experience to Giant's Causeway and the Bushmills Distillery



- Reflect on the legacy of St. Columba in Derry/Londonderry at sacred wells and heritage sites
- Daily moments of prayer, reflection, and shared community throughout the journey

There is an optional extension to Scotland to visit the island of Iona for one day, and visit to Edinburgh where Pastor Gene will guide us through highlights of the city. We will also worship together at St. Giles Church, where Pastor Gene had his first call.

The dates for the Ireland Pilgrimage departing from Cleveland are October 6-16, 2025. The Early Bird Cost for the Ireland Pilgrimage from Cleveland is \$4,499 through May 9. After that date airline prices are scheduled to increase.

The dates for the Ireland pilgrimage and Scotland optional pilgrimage are October 6-20, 2025. The additional cost for the Scotland option is yet to be determined.



SANCTUARY PEOPLE BOOK

Three copies of the book Sanctuary People. have been placed in our library by the Immigration Task Force. The author, Dr. Gina M. Pérez, spoke at Forest Hill Church on Sunday, March 9.

Based on four years of research and interviews at the local, state, and national level, Sanctuary People offers a compelling exploration of the ways in which faith communities are creating activist strategies and enacting new forms of solidarity, working within the sometimes conflicting ideological

between space religion and activism to answer the call of iustice and live their faith. In the book are many references to FHC's Sanctuary movement, including with interviews Leonor Garcia and Rev. Lentz.

75TH ANNIVERSARY OF FOREST HILL CHURCH

In the midst of our current pastoral transition, we might recall change of a different sort—when the Cleveland Heights Presbyterian Church made the journey to its present site 75 years ago.

As recounted in the church history compiled and written by Joan E. McVeen:

At the end of World War II, church leaders anticipated membership growth and a need for larger facilities. During a few years coinciding with the arrival of a young, new pastor, they:

- Put money down and completed purchase of a prominent lot set aside for a "community church" in the Rockefeller Allotment—then a racially and religiously exclusive subdivision;
- Sold the old church buildings at the corner of Mayfield and Preyer Roads to a Jewish congregation comprised of German refugees, sharing the place with them for several years; and
- Began a capital campaign to raise \$200,000 to build upon the new site.

By the spring of 1950, with young families flocking to churches all over America, it was time to begin the move. Groundbreaking for the church's new sanctuary at Lee and Monticello Boulevards took place on May 7, 1950. *The Cleveland Plain Dealer* reported that "Pre-K children will turn the first clods of earth" and "everyone in the congregation will have a chance to dig into the ground with souvenir shovels provided by the minister, Rev. Yoder P. Leith" following Sunday services.


By September 17, 1950, work had progressed sufficiently to allow laying the cornerstone—a "Bronze Brick"—at the front of the new

church. At the same time, the congregation's name officially became "Forest Hill Church, Presbyterian," a wording that complied with expectations by the developers while embracing the congregation's faith heritage and affiliation with the Presbyterian Church (USA).

The newly completed, stand-alone sanctuary (without the education and fellowship hall wings that would be added later) was initially occupied the following spring and dedicated with great fanfare on May 20, 1951.

(These and other interesting details of our congregation's more than 121-year history are in a binder recently prepared by Zivile Khoury. You can find and read it in FHC's Meg Cameron Library.)


