Do you know where?*

WORDS FROM THE REV. DR. GENE MCAFEE



We are living through a period of orchestrated confusion and anxiety, with many of us uncertain where to turn for reliable guidance for our daily

lives and the decisions we feel called to make on behalf of our neighbors, our communities, and our nation. This is nothing new; Jesus told his followers to expect this kind of panic: “They will say to you, ‘Lo, there!’ or ‘Lo, here!’ Do not go, do not follow them” (Luke 17:23).

It’s easy, in times like this, to go all Chicken Little-ish and forget that we have a center – a religious tradition of Scripture, tradition, experience, and reason – that can help us “go placidly amid the noise and haste” (the opening words of the prose poem “Desiderata,” written by Max Erhmann in 1927). How do we tap into that vast, stabilizing resource? One way is through the “daily office.”

The daily office describes regular daily prayer. The term is perhaps best known from the Anglican tradition, where it describes the series of morning and evening prayers, based on Scripture readings, required of all clergy and commended to all believers. But the practice of praying regularly throughout the day is ancient: “Rejoice always,” Paul advised the members of one church, “pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you” (1 Thess. 5:16-18).

For Christians who take those words seriously, the habit of daily devotions – Scripture, prayer, readings, reflection, meditation and other practices – provides a crucial anchor in the noise and haste of daily living. It is a reorienting, a recentering, and a recalibration of one’s body, mind, and spirit in the direction of God. It is a daily reminder of the ground of our being, the vastness of grace, and the purpose toward which we are called: “Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.” The doing of God’s will is our reason for being; we were created by Love, we exist in Love, and we are called to Love. The daily office can be a powerful reminder of this profound truth.

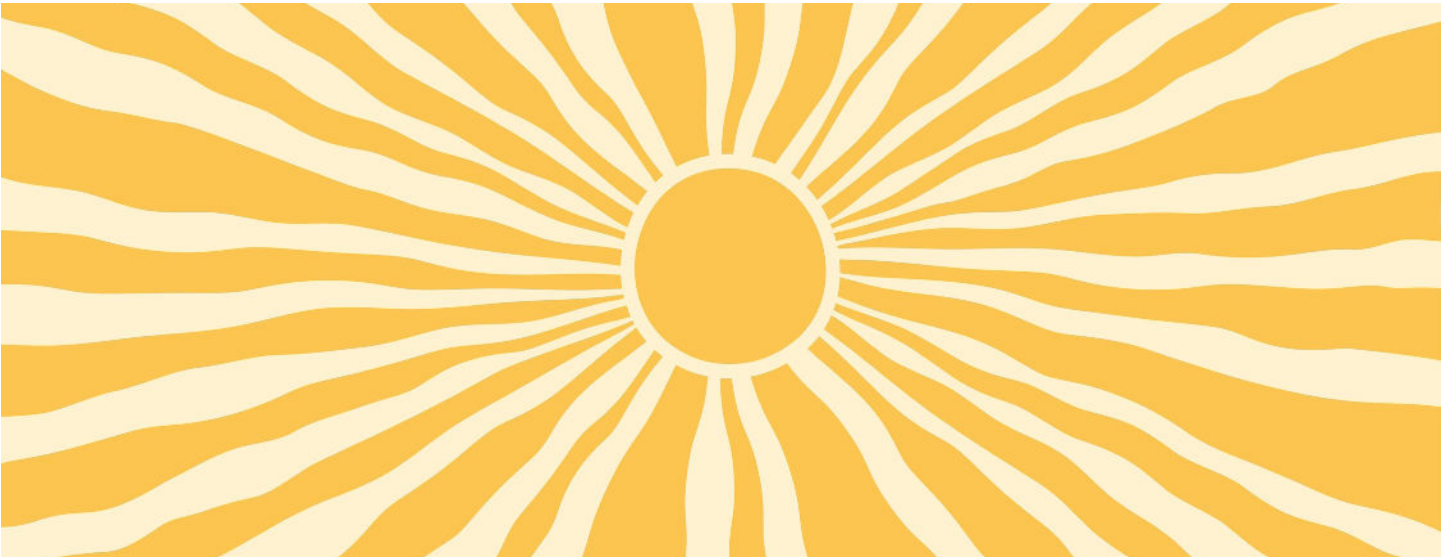
Do you have your own daily office? Have you developed your own “rule of faith”? Have you made the practice of your faith in prayer a daily habit? Is that orientation toward God the still point in your turning world (to borrow from T. S. Eliot)? I hope so and pray so and am ready to help you do so.

What works for one person may not work for another; the point is to discover and cultivate the religious practices that work for you. We need those practices to help us manage the din. Our Lenten discussion of spiritual practices was part of this church’s attempt to help us all enrich and deepen our spiritual lives. That conversation was intended as a beginning, not an end. If you’d like to keep that conversation going, please, just say.

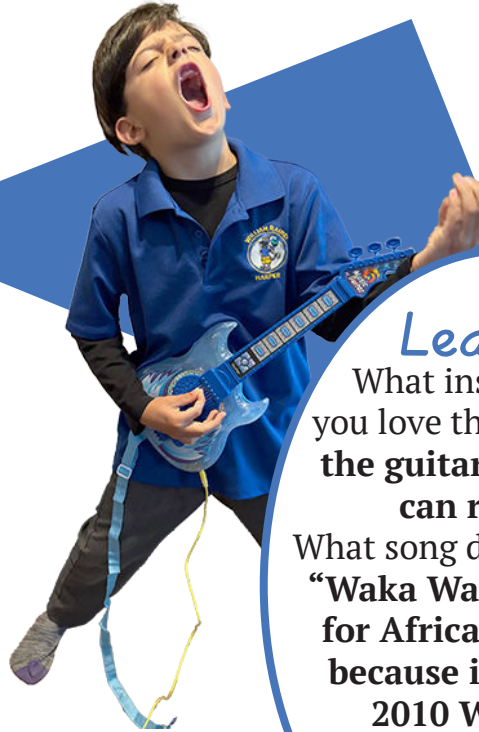

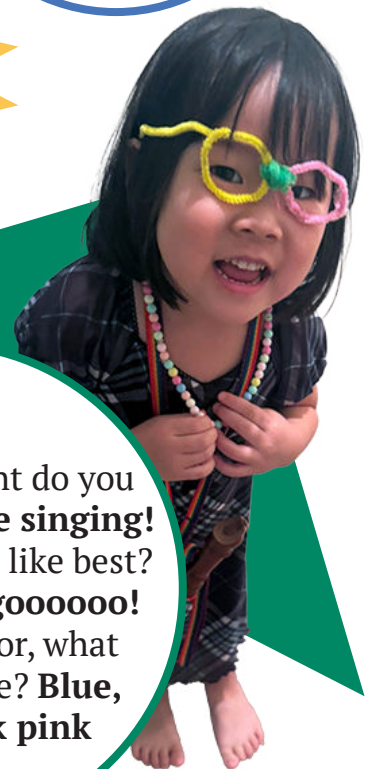

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Vision Statement of Session:

By 2027, Session will courageously embrace the transition by:

*Being spiritually led, more diverse, and more fully prepared to serve
Living into individual gifts
Connecting with and across ministries, and
Communicating openly and actively with congregants, all as a Matthew 25 Church and Beloved Community.*

The Session of FHC met on April 23, 2025. Pastor McAfee was on vacation, so, Rev. Carol Wedell served as the Moderator, as approved by the Presbytery of the Western Reserve.

The meeting opened with prayer, followed by a spiritual conversation about the concepts of belief and faith, as discussed in a reading from “On Our Best Behavior” by Elise Loehnen.

The Financial Report for the period ending March 31, 2025, was received.

The process for 2025 endowment proposals continued. Proposals were presented by the following Ministries: Adult Spiritual Growth, Worship, Justice, and Family, Youth, and Children. Proposals were also presented on behalf of Session. Final selection and approval of 2025 proposals will occur at the May meeting.

A draft of an Anti-Racism policy was received and discussed. A draft of the revised Operations Manual was received and discussed. A new project of the Communications Committee will focus on social media and external communications.

Session discussed and then approved the following five strategic actions, recommended by the Finance Committee, to support the church’s future fiscal health:

- Understand options for greater use of endowment distribution for the operating budget and the potential impact of any policy changes,
- Create and execute a promotional campaign for endowment giving,
- Identify and evaluate actions that could be taken to achieve \$30 to \$40 thousand dollars of annual cost reductions,
- Obtain a deeper understanding of requirements for compensation for a new, installed pastor, and,
- Regularly update the congregation members on the church’s financial status.

Session approved the following recommendations of the Deacons regarding the Membership Rolls:

- Move to Active Roll from Inactive Roll - as requested by Guy Cameron and Peggy Yeager,
- Move to Inactive Roll from Active – as requested by Pam Conover,
- Provide a letter of transfer as requested by Fairmount Presbyterian Church – Beth Garrett and Gary Sampson.

The meeting closed with prayer.

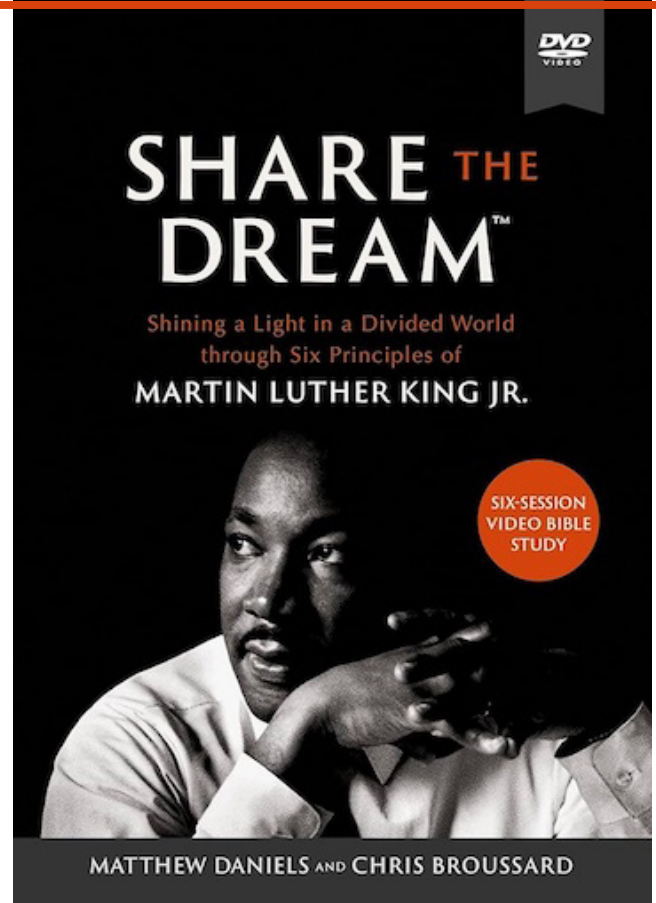
Share the Dream DVD Series

HOMELESS STAND DOWN

From the [Business Volunteers Unlimited \(BVU\) website](#):

Created over 30 years ago to address veteran homelessness, Cleveland's Homeless "Stand Down" — a military term referring to a secure base camp for battle-weary soldiers — has since evolved into an annual day of service for neighbors in need.

Since 2020, BVU has leveraged its position as a connector between Northeast Ohio nonprofits, businesses,

and volunteers to steward the region's Homeless Stand Down efforts, providing guests with necessary resources, respite from the elements, and reconnection to the community.

On Saturday, May 3, 2025, a team from Forest Hill Church joined other volunteers at this annual event. Serving as "personal shoppers," they assisted nearly 1,000 guests while they "shopped" for donated clothes and accessories.

Another lesson I learned, much later in life, was from the legendary folk musician and activist Pete Seeger. I heard him speak at the Rock ‘n’ Roll Hall of Fame and Museum about 25 years ago. After he was interviewed, he took questions from the audience. Someone asked: “With so many problems in the world, what can we do? Where do we start?”

Pete said, “You start right in your own community, and do whatever you can

do to help whatever organizations can use your skills. And it will spread out from there.”

I took that to heart and started volunteering. And I still do that. And so does my wife. We each have our pet projects. But we attended a Christmas party in December and talked to a few people there who all volunteer at the Abundance Food Pantry at Forest Hill Church, the Presbyterian church at the point where Lee and Monticello boulevards come together.

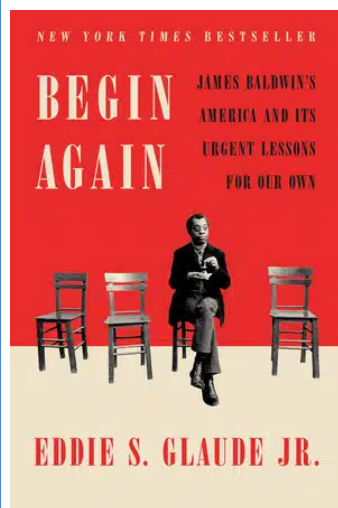

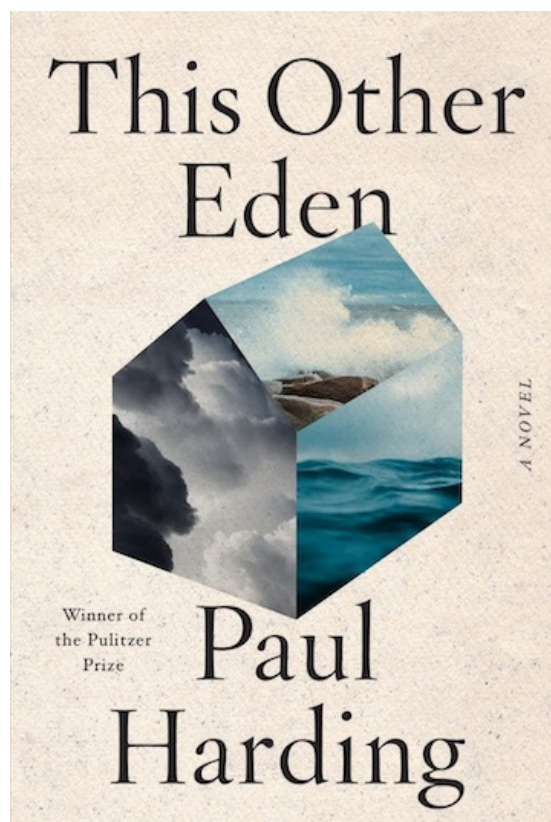
BOOK DISCUSSION

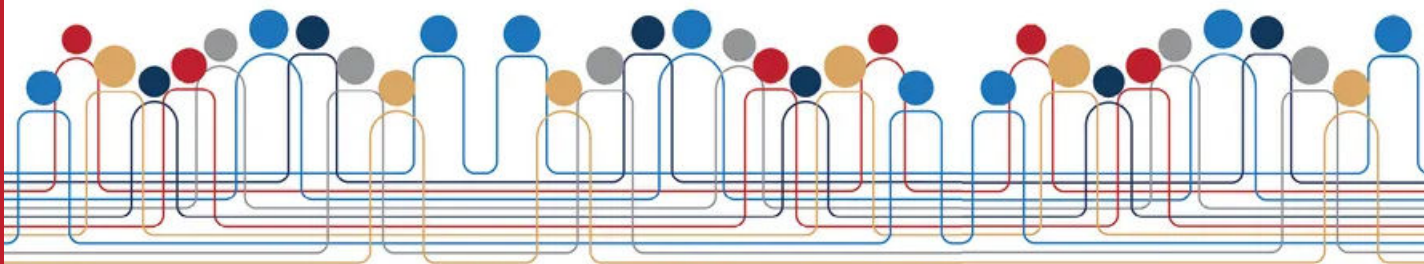
Transplant House of Cleveland is a local non-

EARTH CARE CONGREGATIONS



The Status of Earth Care in 2025

As members of a faith community, we are only too aware of the challenges that continuing to care for God's creation imposes. Protections for clean air and water for all, dealing with climate change, prudent and responsible usage of natural resources, and maintenance of biodiversity are just a few of the issues that confound us.

Earth Justice and other major non-governmental organizations (NGOs) often lead on our behalf, engaging with legislative and other government officials to establish good works, or dis-establish actions which harm all.

Among the various issues which Earth Care and many other organizations take action on:

- Establishing environmental lawsuits against detrimental activities
- Committing government to climate action

- Protecting the western Arctic from wanton oil and gas exploration
- Preserving national monuments
- Preventing air and water pollution and supporting the Environmental Protection Act (EPA)
- Upholding the Endangered Species Act (ESA)
- Safeguarding people from toxic chemicals
- Removing toxic lead from our lives
- Standing up for a functional government

There is hope! When harmful governmental actions are challenged in the courts, most often the lower courts where most issues are decided and which are predominantly liberal, have sided with the plaintiffs—NGOs and other Friends of the Court. Earth-care-harmful executive orders and legislative actions have been overturned as being unconstitutional in over 90% of the time.

Our continued hopes, prayers, written and financial support of Earth Justice and other NGOs is vital!

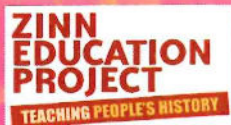
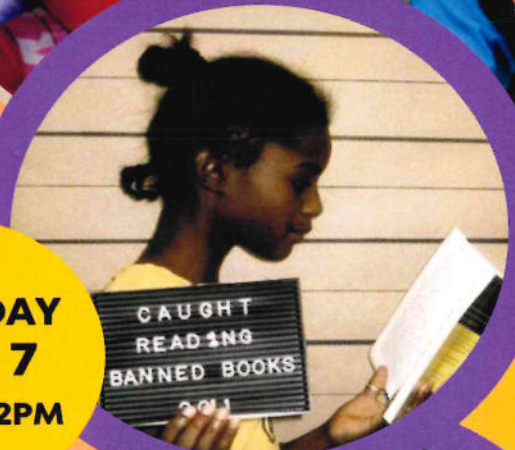
